PROTECTING DYNAMITE

RACING WITH AUTO

MORE DANGEROUS THAN LOOPING-THE-LOOP

Beachey and Oldfield Will Perform Most Perilous Feat at Belleville on June 3rd.

Lincoln Beachey says his race against a high speed automobile is more dangerous than his loop and upside down flying.

"There is nothing that can happen in the air that I cannot get off with. I have enough space to use in dropping before getting the machine under control," declared the great aviator the other day. "But when I am going at a speed of a hundred miles an hour just a few feet above the ground the slightest accident to any part of the machine, or the stopping of the motor for even an instant would send me crashing to the ground at frightful speed before I could even think of what was happening."

"That is why I am the only man that puts up such a race against the speed wagons and motorcycles. Of course there are others who race autos with aeroplanes but they sail high and such a contest is about as exciting as a game of bean-bag at a church social."

"The public expects and demands just a hundred times as much action and chance-taking from me than it does from others. That is the bad feature of having the reputation of being the world's champion dare-devil."

"When I get through with my race against Barney Oldfield's automobile at Belleville, June 3rd, the crowd will have seen the most nerve-ringing event ever staged in this part of the country. I often touch the driver's head with my front wheel as I pass over him and turn him over. I have to bank at an angle of absolute perpendicularity to get around the short turn ahead of the auto."

"But to keep at the head of the procession in my game, a fellow must go pretty close to the limit and I do not intend to let the margin between safety and disaster be any wider than I can help. That is what the crowd pays to see and Beachey never cheats the crowd—that is, excepting of course, those who come to see me get killed."

EX-CONSTABLE REID DEAD

Kratchenko's Confederate Killed In Stony Mountain Prison.

STONY MOUNTAIN, Man., May 19.—Ex-Constable Reid of Winnipeg, formerly of Toronto, and convict Hawkins were so seriously injured by the falling of a scantling upon which they were working as carpenters in the building of the new watchtower on the northwest corner of the prison, yesterday afternoon, that they died last night. Constable Reid was a former constable who was sentenced to serve seven years' imprisonment in the penitentiary only to be caught in the same afternoon. Reid had both legs and one arm broken, besides sustaining internal injuries, while Hawkins had one arm broken, and injuries to the chest, caused by the falling of a heavy timber upon it. The convicts were attended by Prison Surgeon McGuire, and the Warden also sent to Winnipeg for Dr. Moody.

INSPECTOR OFF ON LONG CHASE

R.N.W.M.P. Officer Has Three Years In Which to Catch Murderers.

REGINA, Sask., May 19.—Inspector Beytes of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police force here has been given three years commission to go to the northernmost part of Hudson Bay in an attempt to find the murderers of Radford and Street, two explorers who were believed to have been killed by Eskimos two years ago.

Beytes will go to Chesterfield Inlet, the farthest point north on the Hudson Bay inhabited by white men, and from there take three years' supply of provisions and travel thousands of miles through the interior. The trip will be one of the most dangerous and trying ever undertaken by an officer of the Mounted Police, involving investigations among savage Eskimo tribes, at whose hands the two lost explorers met death.

MUCH TRAFFIC IN TITLES

Germany Has a Busy Trade Alleges Socialist Deputy.

BERLIN, May 19.—Continuing his revelations, begun in the Reichstag last week, in regard to corruption in the German army, the well-known Socialist Deputy, Dr. Lehnkecht, alleges in yesterday's Vorwaerts that the lately deceased Gen. von Lindenau, military governor of Metz, died bankrupt, owing to 101 creditors claims ranging from \$175 to \$37,500.

The gravest charge against the dead officer was that he was accustomed to obtain money by trafficking in decorations and titles. Dr. Lehnkecht reproduces an alleged copy of a letter in which Gen. von Lindenau acknowledged the receipt of several thousand marks, which were to be considered as having been "paid back" when the furnisher of funds had, "through the grace of the Kaiser," become a Prussian professor of medicine.

Gen. von Lindenau was regarded as a brilliant officer.

An Ancient Bible.

A very old bible has been left at this office by Mr. Walker Lawin, of Runnocksburg for our inspection. We at all approaches it and that one is in the possession of Mr. W. C. Mikel, of Belleville, and is not as old. The one before us bears on the title page of the New Testament the date 1673 A.D. which shows that it was printed in the reign of Charles I and an entry in it states that it was the property of Elinor and Thomas Getbin in the year 1693. Along with it are bound up the books of the Apocrypha and the book of Common Prayer with prayers for King Charles I and Mary his consort. There are a few new combinations of so early a date now in existence, while the Church of England Prayer Book underwent its last revision in the reign of Charles II in A.D. 1662. Indian Review

TROOPS AT CRAICAVON?

Unionists Fly Lloyd George With Questions About Ulster.

LONDON, May 19.—There is a lull in the Irish crisis for the moment and it is improbable that much will be done before the debate on the third reading of the Home Rule bill commences.

Lloyd George, however, in the absence of the Prime Minister, who is on attendance on the King at Alderley shot, had to face a number of questions in the House of Commons yesterday relative to the presence of troops around Craicavon, the seat of Capt. Craig, one of the Ulster leaders.

WANTED JACK ROSE DEAD

Former Associate of Becker's Gives Damaging Evidence.

NEW YORK, May 19.—Two convicts from Auburn prison, who were in the Tombs while Charles Becker and the four gunmen who shot Rosenthal were prisoners there, will be called by District Attorney Whitman against Becker. The two convicts were in New York yesterday under guard. These witnesses will testify to conversations they overheard between Becker and the gunmen.

Charles Plitt, Jr., former intimate and press agent for Becker, testified that at his last meeting with Becker in the laboratory of the train on the journey to Sing Sing, Becker said to him: "I want you to kill that squealing Jack Rose." Plitt testified desperately to keep the Plitt testimony from record, but his efforts were unavailing.

ADMIRAL DRURY PASSED AWAY

Sir Charles Was a Native of Rothsay, New Brunswick.

LONDON, May 19.—The death occurred yesterday of Admiral Sir Charles Carter Drury, aged 68. Deceased was born in Rothsay, N.B., his father being colonel of the 30th Regiment. He entered the navy in 1859, and rose to the rank of admiral in 1908. He was A.D.C. to Queen Victoria, 1897-9; naval advisor to the inspector-general of fortifications, 1885-8; member of the ordnance committee, 1893-4; commander-in-chief in the East Indies, 1902-3; in Mediterranean 1907-8; and in the North, 1908-11, when he retired. From 1903-8 he was second naval lord of the Admiralty, and in summer, 1904, he dreamed he fired and Paul died. In fact, everything appears to have been a dream except the revolver, the bullet in the victim's body and the report of the coroner's jury.

Investigation is alleged to have shown that in Alabama Keith and his people were known as "sleep walkers."

EVERYTHING STOOD STILL

All Work on G. T. R. Ceased For a Minute During Funeral.

TORONTO, May 19.—As a mark of respect for a man who had been in the Grand Trunk service for over half a century, all traffic and work over the system ceased for one minute at 2.30 yesterday afternoon, which was the time when the remains of William Walwright, vice-president of the two lines, was laid at rest.

From Moncton in the east on the G. T. P., to the western terminals in Prince Rupert in the Pacific; from Portland on the Grand Trunk to Chicago, not a wheel was turned in the vast machine shops, or out on the roads, while all the clerical staff ceased in their work to pay a silent tribute to the dead in the same way as they did when Charles M. Hays was buried, over two years ago.
