MR. COCKSHUTT WRITES TO THE LABOR COUNCIL

His Reference in House of Commons Was Used in Comparative Sense—Mr. Brewster Also Writes to Labor Men—Council Receives Letters in Friendly Spirit.

The regular meeting of the Trades and Labor Council was held last evening in the Union Hall, President Pearce in the chair.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. There was a fairly large attendance of delegates present, and a large amount of business was transacted in a short space of time, the meeting closing sharp at 10 o'clock.

Credentials were presented from the Carpenters' union, and on motion the following members of that organization were duly seated: J. H. Kelley, A. Tooke, Thos. Hopper, W. Berry, Fred Smith, Lemington.

Reports of Standing Committees
The municipal committee reported that they were still working on the cheese question, and trying to get the city council to bring in a report on the subject. President Pearce stated that he understood that when one of the members of the committee had approached a certain member of the city council in reference to this matter, was told that the Trades and Labor Council should attend to the matter.

The educational committee reported progress. In the discussion which followed it was thought to be a good scheme to have the Industrial Banner distributed throughout the city, as it would help to put the aims and objects of the labor party before the citizens in general.

The committee appointed to see after the securing of electric fans for the hall submitted figures for the same, and on motion this matter was laid over for two weeks.

The assessment committee reported that they considered the publication of the assessment rolls had been a good thing for the citizens in general, and considered that it was in the best interests of the workingman that the same should continue to be published.

Communications.
The following communication was received from Mr. W. S. Brewster, M.P., regarding his attitude on the question of property qualifications: H. J. Symons, Esq., Secy. Brantford Trades and Labor Council.

I have your favor of the 5th inst. in regard to the question of the abolition of property qualifications in regard to the election of aldermen. I brought this matter up at the last session of the Legislature, when the Municipal Act was being amended.

Under the head of new business, exception was taken by some of the delegates to the explosion of torpedoes on the railway tracks, and condemned the same as being dangerous. A motion was passed instructing the secretary to write the proper authorities in regard to the matter.

and the matter in question came up in committee of the whole House. I gave the reasons fully, why the property qualification clause should be struck out but got no support except by Mr. Studholm, the Labor member for East Hamilton.

I will be pleased to bring the matter up again before the House next session if your Council think it advisable.

In the discussion which followed, it was thought that the matter should be brought to the attention of the Dominion Trades Congress, so that every council in the Dominion could act upon it, and on motion this was ordered to be done, also that the communication of Mr. Brewster be received and he be asked to again bring this matter up at the next session of the Legislature.

A communication was also read from Mr. W. F. Cockshutt in regard to the statement which he had made recently that workmen in this and other cities were living "almost in affluence." In his communication he admitted that the word "comfortably" would have expressed his meaning better, although the former words were used by him in a comparative sense. He claimed that his remarks were in no way antagonistic to the working classes in any sense, and said he was willing to meet a deputation of the council at any time to discuss all matters in this connection.

On motion, the communication was received, and Mr. Cockshutt invited to address the council on the matter at the next meeting.

Several accounts were read and ordered to be paid.

OWNER OF CRAGANOUR WANTS DERBY STAKE

LONDON, June 18.—C. Bower is May, the owner of Craganour, the disqualified winner of the Derby, has been granted an interim injunction until Friday restraining the stewards of the Jockey Club and the stakeholders from parting with the funds in their hands on the ground that Craganour was entitled to be declared the winner of the race.

The plaintiff declares that the action of the defendants in allowing the objection to the horse was invalid. A motion for a permanent injunction is to be heard on Friday. The suit has excited immense interest in sporting circles.
