THE FIRST BAPTIST.

The sermon property centered about the watchword, "Safety First." The music of the day was excellent. The choir sang in the morning, "What Will It Be When the King Comes," and in the evening, "Just As I Am," in the evening. Miss Hutchinson's solo, "Softly and Tenderly Jesus is Calling," was appropriately sung by Mr. Cullen.

SYDENHAM STREET.

The services yesterday were well attended, the pastor preaching at both services. In the morning he spoke on "The Life of Lord Strathcona," and in the evening he preached the third of a series on the Ten Commandments—"The High Crime of Profanity." Mr. W.
