PONTIFF PASSES

(Continued from Page 1) His eyes opened and his lips moved and it was plain that he was making an effort to impart a final blessing. For a moment it seem-ed that dissolution had taken place and then the lips moved again: "Together in one, all things in Christ;" he whispered. Dr Marchi-afava released the wrist which dropped pulseless on the pontiff's breast. The physician bent over the bed listening for a heart that was stilled. "It is all over," he said and reverently kissed the pontiff's hand. In turn the others did the same, after which they intoned prayers for the dead.

Immeliately after candle lights flickered in all the windows of the Vatican and the whole personnel of the apostolic palace with the permission of the papal secretary passed by the body kissing the hand of the pontiff as they passed. Throughout the night message had been received from the heads of many states inquiring the condition of his holiness. All were immediately notified of his death by Cardianal Merry Del Val.

As is the practice at the vatican the news of the death of the pope was withheld from the public until it had been officially announced to the various governments. Then it was made known here. The Italian premier, Signor Salandra at once ordered that the necessary measures be taken to guarantee the complete liberty of the provincial government of the of cardinals which is the temporary custodian of the supreme power of the church during the interregnum pending the election of a pope. The matter of a conclave was discussed to-day. It is said that a majority of the car-dinals are in favor of holding it in Rome as is usual and further, because of the neutrality of Italy in the present war. Others, however, suggested that it would be better to meet in Holland, a country which they regarded as even more neutral than Italy. Among the candidates already mentioned are Cardianals Maffi, De Tai, Ferrata, Agliardi, Pompili and Serafini, the latter ex-nuncio of Mex-

There is much interest in the matter of where the body of the pope will find its final resting place. It is recalled that the body of Pius IX, while being carried from St. Peters to St. Lawrence, was the cause of a riot. For this reason the body of Pope Leo. although he had expressed a wish to be buried in St. John Lateran, where his tomb was erected, is still in St. Peters as the late pope feared that the transportation might cause disorders. It is believed that Pius X chose St. Peters for his tomb in order to avoid the possibility of unpleasantness.

A VICTIM OF WAR. ROME, Aug. 20.— Cardinal Della Volpe, chamberlain of the church on the pope's death early this morning, assumed direction of the Holy See during the inter-regnum. A message had been sent to the pope's brother, Angelo, urging him to come to Rome as quickly as possible, while the pope's sister, Signora Parroline reached the vatican before death ensued

Confusion reigned at the vatican because these, with the exception of the papal secretary, who takes charge of affairs in such an emergency were out of Rome, so little was the death of the pope expected. Outside the apostolic palace the scene was mournful, from early in the day automobiles and carriages carrying cardinals and high ecclesiastics to the vatican, passed con-

tinuously.

Hundreds of visitors made inquiry regarding the pope's con-

The "Giornals D'Italis, discussing the difficulties of holding a conclave for the election of a pope, while the world is at war, says that if Italy were among the belligerents, every facilities would belligerents, every facilities would be given the sacred college to meet. It expresses the belief that a new pope might be chosen from among the foreign cardinals, for instance Cardinal William Van Rossum, of the Archdiocese of Utrecht, the Netherlands, who would be representative of a neu-

tral power.
The Tribune says:
"The pope was the victim of the war. In these latter days he dictated a great number of despatches and tried to avoid the horrors of an European war. The rupture of peace of peace broke down the last remains of his strength."

That the pope was grieving deeply over the state of war in Europe even to the last, was evidenced by his words during one of his lucid intervals in the afternoon. "Now I am forced to see," he whispered," the spectacle of my own children, even those who yesterday worked here with me, cassock and cowl for the soldier's uniform, yesterday, although they were of different nationality, they were here studying in sympathtic companionship; now, in different fields they are armed against each other, ready to take each other's lives."
