AUSTRIAN STATEMENT ON RETREAT

Austrian Press Headquarters, via London, June 25.—The results of the success achieved by General Von Boehm-Ermolli's army in taking Lemberg and in the battles to the east of the Galician capital are making themselves felt also on the Dniester. Since taking Mikolajow, this army has been operating with General Linsingen's army to the south and has been pressing the Russians back irresistibly upon their positions north of the Dniester. The Russians are offering a desperate resistance on the Dniester, especially in the center, to permit their retreating armies to save themselves and their war material. The retreat of the Russians along the San and in the angle of the Vistula continues under conditions which are bringing successful results to the pursuing army of Archduke Joseph Ferdinand.

Lull Takes Place In Fighting

London, June 25.—Something in the nature of a lull in the fighting, as compared to the feverish activity of the past fortnight is enabling the military observers at both sides to take stock of the present situation and forecast future operations.

Petrograd claims that the Russian defensive positions are so secure that the Austro-Germans will not be able to withdraw many troops for use against the allies of Russia. The Russians assert further that their present line before Warsaw is as strong as it ever was, and that their armies on the River Dniester will fall back only if the eastward drive of the Austro-Germans from Lemberg threatens to cut them off.

The authorities of the central empires are less communicative concerning their future intentions and movements, but it is believed that Warsaw again is their objective.

In England the campaign for munitions is in full swing, with the possibility of national registration to ascertain the "man power" of the nation. That England appreciates the need of adding to her fighting resources is sufficiently indicated by the publication in the London Times of tables showing that the casualties of officers during the past month come within a few hundred of the total officers' casualties during the entire South African war. The total in South Africa was 2,752, while the lists since May 26 show that 2,440 officers have been killed or wounded, or reported missing.

RE-EDUCATING WOUNDED.

Bourges, France, June 25.—The school opened here for the re-education of maimed soldiers, is operating with great success. The number of pupils enrolled already is 150, nearly all of whom will be unable to work at the trades by which they earned their living before the war, and must learn some new means of making a livelihood. A staff of eminent physicians is faithfully attending the unfortunate, preparing them for their changed future and helping lighten their tasks. Among the instructors are former teachers who are themselves crippled. In spite of their afflictions, the students go about their work gaily. Men who before the war were grocers, plasterers, barbers and miners now are designing patterns for lace while farm hands and butcher boys are taking courses in electricity and architecture. The course in stenography and accounting is the most popular, the pupils, including a former head waiter, a carpet-layer and gardener.

An order promulgating all forms of alcohol before noon and after 8.30 p.m. to army and navy men and officers has been issued by Brig-Gen. Townley in Birmingham. Clubs are included in the prohibition. The new rule is causing unfavorable comment.

GERMAN PRISONER IS SHOT DEAD

Four Others Seriously Wounded Trying to Escape From Prison.

Amherst, N.S., June 25.—During an outbreak early this morning at the alien internment camp near Amherst, one of the prisoners, Fritz Clause, a German, was shot dead, and four others, also said to be Germans, were seriously wounded. A rumor was abroad during the day that the shooting occurred when a squad of German prisoners attempted to escape. Few details are obtainable. All that can be learned is contained in the following version obtained from a competent source:

"While the prisoners of war in the detention camp were being conducted to the compound for physical exercise, one of them, Fritz Clause, assaulted one of the international police, knocking him insensible. The camp police with the guard was called out to quell the mutiny, and in the meantime the originator of the trouble was shot dead and four of the other prisoners were seriously wounded."

There are about 59 prisoners in the camp, including more than 100 German sailors who were rescued from cruisers after engagements in the Atlantic.

Sympathy For the Allies in Portugal

By Special Wire to the Courier.

Paris, June 25.—A Havas despatch from Lisbon says: The ministerial declaration read in the chamber yesterday afternoon renews manifestations of sympathy for the allies, discloses the governmental decision to present to parliament documents which throw light on the attitude assumed by Portugal in relation to the European war and in conclusion affirms the country's resolution to seek revenge for damage suffered in Africa. After the reading of the declaration Alexandre Braga, leader of the Democrats, promised the government the support of his party.

"Antonio Almeida, head of the revolutionists, declared he would fight the new government and would attempt to obtain justice for Pimenta Castro, the former premier. Senho Almeida's assertion aroused a great demonstration in the galleries reserved for the public. The session of the chamber was suspended, while he left the room, followed by his friends.

Lemberg Was Being Made Slavic

By Special Wire to the Courier.

Berlin, June 25, via London.—The Russians assert that they have despatched to their correspondent at Lemberg descriptive of the situation in that city which reads as follows:

"Reviewing the nine months' rule of the Russians in Lemberg, it is sad to think that the matter of Lemberg in the Galician capital were certain former government officials, whose salaries could no longer be paid. Prominent families were reduced to begging in the streets, and compelled to satisfy their hunger in the kitchens of other people. Well known men of Lemberg chopped and sold wood, while their wives baked and peddled bread and cakes around the city."

"The price of food reached exorbitant figures. Butter cost six crowns (\$1.20) per kilogram (2.20 pounds), or equivalent to 55 cents a pound. The city of Lemberg issued emergency two crown notes, which, however, had a barter value of only one crown."

"The regular Russian policemen and Cossacks patrolled the city. The schools were permitted to stay open only with the express consent of the military governor. At least five hours every week had to be devoted to the study of the Russian language. Only text books approved for use in Russian schools were permitted in Lemberg. The Russian calendar was introduced. Certain prominent residents favorable to Russia assisted the invaders and one of these, M. Gluszkiewicz, a well known Ruthenian leader, was later rewarded by being named the Russian Mayor."

"All men of military age were taken into custody by the Russian authorities as were all pensioned Austrian and Hungarian officers. These included General Ryk, a veteran of Sebastopol, over 90 years of age."

"The Russian municipal officials began leaving the city the latter part of May and all had disappeared before Lemberg fell. Emperor Nicholas paid one visit to the Galician capital while it was under Russian control. Ruthenian books were destroyed by the Russian authorities and the exchange of telegrams and letters in the Ruthenian language was prohibited."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed on the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
