By Courier Leased Wire. Bulletin, Washington, July 26. American forces between the Ourcq and the Marne continued to press back the enemy. General Pershing reported in his communique of yesterday received to-day at the war department.

Many Are Disloyal

It is quite within bounds to say that in the armies of pan-Germany, of every three soldiers there is one who certainly does not desire to make use of his weapons against the Entente; and one who, on the contrary, will joyfully make use of them, as soon as the opportunity is offered, to assist in the destruction of pan-Germany, whose continuance would perpetuate his own slavery and that of his people.

FOOD SITUATION IN FRANCE.

Some Facts About the Shortage at Present Time.

In 1914 production of wheat in France was about 82 per cent. of the normal production. In 1917 the production was but 45 per cent. of the normal production (and this, remember, never was enough for her consumption). After deducting the amount necessary for seed, the 1917 production was one-third France's needs.

Food never has been wanted in France. Consequently, her normal food consumption always has been very close to actual food necessities.

France large amounts of food and nobody disputes the fact that the British Isles are short of food.

Seventy per cent. appear to be the men of France have been forced to go from the farms for military service, leaving the women to carry on the arduous work of food production.

In 1914 the French home food supply was kept up to about 85 per cent. of normal. This year it has fallen to between 60 and 70 per cent. There is only one-third the normal supply of milk in France.

The ration of the French soldiers has been reduced twice, because of the shortage of food supplies.

France is on a ration of one pound of meat per person per week, including horse flesh.

For months, France has been on a ration of 1-1-10 pound of sugar per person per month.

The rough flour used in France is mixed with wheat substitutes, leaving the dark French war loaf. It should be remembered in this connection that bread has always formed 52 per cent. of the French diet, and 39 per cent. of the Canadian diet.

Dinner by Daylight.

It seems incredible that anyone should object to the very desirable and healthful plan whereby so many thousands of workers are presented with extra hours of outdoor enjoyment for all the outdoor months of the year. The plan is to eat dinner by daylight. There are always objectors to every movement and the objectors in this case appear to be the women who like to give dinner parties. Even a "little dinner" of six or eight people is apt to last over an hour or an hour and a half of time and hostesses claim that it is impossible to make the dinner table look right by daylight. Flowers, silver and table decorations have not the same effect, viewed by the rays of the setting sun that they have under the subdued gleam of shaded candles; neither do the women guests look quite as charming by day-light as they would by candle-light or the soft rays of indirect electric light. And the provoking part of it is that Canadian servants will accede gracefully to such a vital change in the domestic schedule—and in their hours of freedom—as an eight o'clock or half-past eight o'clock dinner such as is the rule in England, where daylight lasts late, would involve, indeed, a newly established dinner hour of 8:30 would be a most desirable and profitable change in the average Canadian kitchen.

So the hostesses these days must make the best of it and wait for October for the giving of conventional dinners, lighted harmoniously and becomingly—by shaded candle-lights and indirect gas or electric fixtures. Meanwhile, the dinner table, with fresh flowers and windows wide open to the sunset glow, is not so unattractive after all; and tall candles in silver holders may be placed on the table, ready for light when the moment the outside light begins to fade. Society is getting away from artificiality these busy days of war, and dinner by daylight is one of the features of the new regime.
