Dogs not chained up or in harness must all be muzzled.

Vicious dogs are all to be shot.

Dogs found at large without muzzles will be impounded, and 75e per day will be charged up against them. A farther energe of \$25 may also be collected.

Owners may also be proceeded against and in default of payment may be imprisoned for not to exceed 30 days.

Unclaimed dogs may be sold in 10 days and a title so obtained shall be held good.

If the dog brings more than is charged against him the balance shall be held for the owner.
