Station Managers, Inspectors, Buyers, Butchers, Egg Handlers, Pluckers, Dressers, Packers, Shippers, Agents, Bookkeepers, Stenographers, and General Clerks for Twelve Stations.

This Company is formed to advance Canadian trade with England in dressed poultry, turkeys, ducks, geese, dressed meats, eggs and other farm produce, and is now arranging to establish

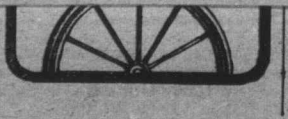
