## ITALIANS HELD A TOWN

RIOT AT HUBBARD'S COVE NOT YET ENDED.

en Working on Mackenzie & Mann's South Shore Railway Disappointed in Their Pay-Contractor Missing.

Halifax, Dec. 28.-The little Village of Hubbard's Cove, well known to Americans as a tourist resort, has been all day in the hands of an infuriated Italian mob of workmen, employed on Mackenzle & Mann's South Shore Railway construction, which is going on near that place. The contractor for that section of the line, John A. Wheaton of St. John, N.B., was behind in Wheaton of St. John, N.B., was behind in his payments of wages for November, and suddenly left the place a few days ago. The Italians have been showing their discontent for several days, but were kept in check by their foremen. To-day, however, the storm broke. The contractor was expected back last evening, with Mackenzle & Mann's chief engineer. His non-arrival, together with the absence of a son, who left quietly last night, and the tatended departure of Timekeeper McNeill, brought the matter to a crisis.

McNeill's departure was anticipated, and forcible measures were taken to prevent it. Groups of armed Italians gathered at various points, and, before the timekeeper was aware of the situation, he was obliged to se R refuge at a hotel a few doors from

Every effort was made to quiet the Ital-Every effort was made to quiet the Italian mob, and it des. ed from any attack on Mr. McNeill at the hotel as long as no escape was attempted. The hotel was guarded throughout the day on all sides by men with revolvers and knives, and an increased guard will be on to-night. Affairs to-day were at such a pitch that the Italian Consul had to be sent for. He arrived to-night, accompanied by a Halifax lawyer, and had an interview with interpreter Bango, who has all the week held his men in check with considerable skill. As a result, the Italians were dispersed late to-night, but more trouble is anticipated.

THE MARKET REPORTS. Little Change in Grain or Live Stock

-The Latest Quotations. Saturday Evening, Dec. 27. Toronto St. Lawrence Market.

Business at St. Lawrence Market was dull to-day, the present inter-holiday season evidently being one in which buyers who thronged the market on Christmas eve prefer to await until next week before buying New Year's provisions. The street market was somewhat busier than yesterday, 1,900 bushels of grain being the total receipts.

Wheat—One hundred bushels of red sold unchanged at 63c per bushel and 500 bushels sold at 64c.

Bariey—Five hundred bushels sold firmer at 44c to 48½c per bushel.

Oats—Prices were ½c higher; 800 bushels sold at 34c to 34½c.

Ifny and Straw—There was no change in prices, although the market was firm. About 20 loads of hay were offered and sold at \$13 to \$15 per ton for timothy and \$6 to \$9 for mixed. One load of straw sold at \$10.

Dressed Hogs—Recripts were very light and the demand was equally so. Business in this line is quite dull. Prices quoted are \$7.50 to \$8 per cwt.

Poultry—The demand is small and all poultry is quoted slightly easier.

### DEFEAT WAS GUMPLETE.

MOORISH IMPERIAL ARMY FLED PRECIPITATELY.

Abandoned Guns, Rifles, Tents and Everything Else When Beaten by Pretender's Forces.

London, Dec. 29 .- The complete route at Taza of the Moorish Imperial army by tender to the throne, which was reported December 23, has now been officially con-firmed. The imperial forces abandoned their guns, rifes, ammunition, tent's and beasts of burden, and fled precipitately to Fee.

Tangier, Morocco, Dec. 29-On Dec. 22 Tangier, Morocco, Dec. 29—On Dec. 22 10,000 Shereedan troops, commanded by a brother of the Sultan's Minister of War, received orders to concentrate and take the offensive against the pretender at Taza. Before the Shereedan's moved upon him, the pretender attacked them with large bodies of cavalry. The imperial army was surrounded, completely routed, and fied in disorder toward Fez, abandoning all material of war. The first lugitive arrived at Fez on the morning of D.c. 24. The gates of Fez are at present shat, shops are closed, and the population is excited, but there has been no disorder. The European colony at Fez, consisting of about twenty persons, is taking no steps to leave the town, and appears to be satisfied that there is no immediate danger.

Loudon, Dec. 29.—Wiring from Fez December 23, the correspondent of The Times says the situation was so critical that he was making preparations to leave immediately. The same correspondent, in a despatch from Tangier, December 27, says:—"I got away from Fez just in time. I arrived here this morning, with the first naws of the disaster. The resies are reported to be marching on Fez, which is incapable of defence for more than a few days, owing to its position, the absolute lack of a supply of provisions and the ruinous state of the town walls. The population will remain loyal only as dong as the Sultan can protect and feed them. A few days of siege means starvation."

### MRS. HALL ESCAPES.

Woman and Son Under Surveillance

in a Windsor Hotel Get Away. Windsor, Dec. 29 .- In vain have detec tives, police and lawyers been seeking clues as to the wheresboats of Mrs. C. A. Hall and her eleven-year-old son Alger, who escaped from the International Hotel, Windsor, despite the vigilance of four or five detectives. Mr. Wigle of the International says the mother and son escaped through a side door of the hotel on Christmas night, their exit being arranged by employees of the hotel, who sympathize with the woman. They were not disguised, but the bluding snow and darkness served to hide them. After the escape Mrs. West remained for some time in the room occupied by her daughter to avoid suspicion. Later she descended and paid the bill. Dr. Hall refused to talk. He takes the disappearance of his wife and son philosophically. "I am still here, and I still intend to recover the boy," said the doctor, "but more than that I cannot say."
