

ITALIANS HELD A TOWN.

A RIOT AT HUBBARD'S COVE NOT YET ENDED.

Men Working on Mackenzie & Mann's South Shore Railway Disappointed in Their Pay-Contractor Missing.

(Special Despatch to The Globe.)

Hubbard's Cove, Dec. 29.—The little village of Hubbard's Cove, well known to Americans as a tourist resort, has been all day in the hands of an infuriated Italian mob of workmen, employed on Mackenzie & Mann's South Shore Railway construction, which is going on near that place. The contractor for that section of the line, John A. Wharton of St. John, N.B., was taken to the hospital for a broken leg, and the workmen, suddenly left the place a few days ago. The Italian mob has been showing their discontent for several days, but were kept in check by their foreman. Today, however, the contractor was missing. The contractor was expected back last evening, with Mackenzie & Mann's chief engineer. His non-arrival, together with the absence of a son, who left quietly last night, and the intended departure of the contractor's son, brought the matter to a crisis.

McNeill's departure was anticipated, and forcible measures were taken to prevent it. Groups of armed Italians gathered at various points, and before the contractor was aware of the situation, he was obliged to seek refuge at a hotel a few doors from his own.

DEFEAT WAS CERTAIN.

MOORISH IMPERIAL ARMY FLED PRECIPITATELY.

Abandoned Guns, Rifles, Tents and Everything Else When Beaten by Pretender's Forces.

London, Dec. 29.—The complete route of the Moorish Imperial army by rebels under the leadership of the pretender to the throne, which was reported December 23, has now been officially confirmed. The imperial forces abandoned their guns, rifles, ammunition, tents and beasts of burden, and fled precipitately to Fez.

Tangier, Morocco, Dec. 29.—On Dec. 22 10,000 Moorish troops, commanded by a brother of the Sultan's Minister of War, received orders to concentrate and take the offensive against the pretender at Tana. Before the Moorish army upon him, the pretender attacked them with large bodies of cavalry. The imperial army was surrounded, completely routed, and fled in disorder toward Fez, abandoning all material on the morning of Dec. 24. The gates of Fez are at present shut, shops are closed, and no one is allowed to enter the city. The pretender is said to have fled to Fez, consisting of about twenty persons, is taking no steps to leave the town, and appears to be satisfied that there is no immediate danger.

London, Dec. 29.—Writing from Fez December 23, the correspondent of The Times says the situation was so critical that he was making preparations to leave immediately. The same correspondent, in a despatch to the Morning Post, says that he got away from Fez just in time. I arrived here this morning, with the first news of the disaster. The royal army of the pretender for more than a few days, owing to its position, the absolute lack of a supply of provisions and the ruinous state of the city. The population will remain loyal only as long as the Sultan can protect and feed them. A few days of siege means starvation.

MRS. HALL ESCAPES.

Woman and Son Under Surveillance in a Windsor Hotel Get Away.

Windsor, Dec. 29.—In vain have detectives, police and lawyers been seeking clues as to the whereabouts of Mrs. C. A. Hall and her eleven-year-old son, Alger, who disappeared from the International Hotel, Windsor, despite the vigilance of four or five detectives. Mr. Wigle of the International Hotel and the constable who escorted through a side door of the hotel on Christmas night, their exit being arranged by the hotel, who sympathized with the woman. They were not disguised, but the hotel was dark and Mrs. West remained for some time in the room occupied by her daughter to avoid suspicion. Later she descended and paid the bill. Dr. Hall refused to talk. He disappeared the morning after the disappearance of his wife and son philosophically. "I am still here, and I still intend to recover the boy," said the doctor, "but more than that I cannot say."

Mrs. Hall was served with a notice to produce the body of her son in court in Toronto on December 30, but as she is now probably outside the jurisdiction of Canadian law, she has a very little chance of her obeying the summons.

MINNETONKA AT BERMUDA.

Disabled American Steamer That Broke Away From Her Tow.

New York, Dec. 29.—A dispatch received here says the American steamer Minnetonka, which left Newport, Eng., Nov. 30 for Boston, has arrived at Bermuda in distress.

A Toronto Broker Gone.

Toronto, Dec. 29.—David A. Robson, who carried on what was ostensibly a broking business at room 105, McKinnon building, 400 Adelaide street, is missing from the city, and has left behind him debts to the amount of several thousand dollars and some scores of clients who he succeeded in victimizing before he departed for the States. He is believed to be in Detroit. Robson was very well known on the street. A large man, weighing around two hundred pounds, with a thick, dark beard, and a walk with a crutch. He had the character generally of a good fellow, and certainly latterly was a free spender and liberal with his money.

Robson lent money to people who desired to lend money at from two to five per cent. a month interest, loaning to persons temporarily embarrassed who were in good situations or who could produce satisfactory security. It is understood that he had nearly thirty thousand dollars belonged to several money lenders, who did not care to be known to handle their fun in this manner, his customers ran up into the hundreds.
