ONE INSURRECTION BLIGHTED.

New York, Aug. 28.—Arms belonging to Gen. Rivera, a Venezuelan refugee in Curacao, have been found in the hands of the authorities. Port of Spain, Aug. 28.—The German cruiser Vineta will sail to-day for Carapano. The Orinoco district is peaceful.

SULTAN ATTEMPTED HIS OLD GAME.

Constantinople, August 26.—The following was the position of affairs immediately preceding the departure of the French ambassador, M. Constans: The Turkish government was showing a disposition to regard the French demands as settled by the irade relating to the quays and the Albanian land seizures. The French ambassador, in order to prevent a misunderstanding, wrote to Tewfik Pasha, the minister of Foreign Affairs, yesterday that the demands made August 11, and that unless they were conceded before noon to-day, M. Constans would leave the city. The Porte instead of yielding, asked for twenty-four hours' delay and made alternative proposals which were so unacceptable that M. Constans did not reply to them.

THE ANDOVER ELECTION.

London, Aug. 27.—The parliamentary election held yesterday to fill the seat in the House of Commons for the Andover division of Hampshire, made vacant by the death of William W. B. Beach (father of the return of Edmund Beckett, Conservative, who received 3,696 votes, to 3,473 cast for his Liberal opponent, George Judd.

LIVES LOST IN COLUMBIA

Thousands Slain in Revolt Movements and Slaughter Going on.

Frontiers of Ecuador are Lined With Armed men Ready for Bloodshed.

New York, Aug. 28.—A revolutionary force of 2,000 men has pushed its way over the border from Colombia into Venezuela, says the Colon correspondent of the Herald. This force is to aid in the overthrow of President Castro. When his downfall is accomplished a similar course will be followed in Nicaragua.

Trouble is imminent on both eastern and the southern boundaries of Colombia.

Troops have been rushed in both directions and the frontiers of Venezuela and of Ecuador are lined with armed men, ready to advance at a moment's notice.

No secret is made of the threatening attitude of the Colombian authorities. They assert that the revolution there has been enabled to continue only by the aid of the liberal governments of the neighboring republics and that to insure peace at home it has become necessary to inaugurate a war of foreign conquest.

THOUSANDS OF LIVES SACRIFICED.

It is assumed that Ecuador would join with Venezuela in any moment against Colombia—the two liberal governments standing united against the Conservative element in control here, and making counter charges of interference with their affairs and of fostering revolutions.

There seems little doubt that the charges on both sides are well founded. The Liberals of one republic have lent a helping hand to their struggling brethren in adjacent territory, and the Conservatives have retaliated in kind.

Colombia has, however, been the chief sufferer, as her revolution has already lasted nearly two years.

It is estimated that from 25,000 to 40,000 lives have already been sacrificed.

The end is not yet, as the smoldering embers of revolt are coming into flame in a dozen sections simultaneously and the Liberals do not hesitate to announce that they are preparing to deal a final blow.

The Conservatives retaliate by declaring that they have vanquished every army that has been collected and that there remain only a few bushwhackers, who carry on a sporadic guerrilla warfare, attacking corporals' guards, fleeing from larger bodies, robbing exposed stores and ranches and pillaging warfairs.

"BANDS OF VAGABONDS."

New York, Aug. 28.—The ex-governor of the department of Panama, Facundo Mutes Duran, now in New York, discussing the situation in Colombia, said that the rebels are a band of vagabonds and that he was certain the government would subdue the rebellion.

He said that when he left Panama a few days ago nothing unusual was going on. He had not heard anything of the whereabouts of Gen. Uribe Uribe. As for foreign warships, he said there would be no necessity for landing marines.

PEACE RUMOR IS IGNORED

Leader Shaffer Says the Strike Will go on for a While.

Trust Officials Reiterate That the Strikers Must Surrender.

Pittsburg, August 28.—Shaffer was averse to talking on the subject of peace this morning. Finally he said that while reports of a new peace movement may be true, he had no knowledge of it. He did not see how a settlement could be effected without the Amalgamated association, and while some may hope for such good luck, yet in the face of arms made by the strikers, he would not back down from his original position.

The steel officials reiterated that no overtures for peace had gone from the strikers and that the strike could only be settled by the return of the men to their places.

It was rumored last night that Shaffer had sent out letters to all members of the executive committee of the Amalgamated association inviting their approval of a peace plan agreed on last Saturday by the representatives of the National Civic Federation and the Amalgamated association headquarters officers. The plan proposes:

First—That the New York offer of July 27, made by Messrs. Schwab and Morgan, be accepted. This provided that the tinsmiths resume work under the scale signed for the year beginning July 1; that the Hoop company sign for all mills signed for last year, and that the Sheet Steel Co. sign for all mills signed for last year, except Old Meadow and Saltburg.

Second—That a provision be arranged, but not signed, for Painters, Lindey and McCutcheon, and the Clark mill, leaving recognition of the union men.

Third—that the United States Steel Corporation officially declare its attitude toward organized labor, this declaration to take such form as will have a reassuring effect upon the men in the mills.

FOURTH—OF THE END.

New York, August 28.—A special from Wheeling, W. Va., says: A man connected with the Federation of Labor says there have been five conferences between representatives of the federation and the steel corporation since the close of the mine workers' conference at Indianapolis, which President Gommon, who called representatives of the federated bodies to meet here. That meeting of labor presidents was held within a few days after the coal conference, and steel were taken to secure a meeting with the steel officials.

The first conference was held in Indianapolis, another in Cleveland, and another in New York and another in Pittsburgh.

Finally a plan of settlement was reached satisfactory to all. This proposition is now being voted on by the lodges of the Amalgamated association.

It is a compromise, and gives the Amalgamated association a slight advantage over what the steel people last offered, the union getting a showing in mills that have been unionized since the strike began.

This information was also given by a member of Mountain City Lodge of the Amalgamated association, in this district. He said his lodge voted to accept the proposition last night, and it was expected that the strike would be settled within 10 days.

STEEL STRIKE HITS FARMERS.

Chicago, Aug. 28.—States, a large number of whom have been in constant at the Auditorium, have declined an advance of 10 per cent in the price of plows and all plow repairs during the coming year. The present strike of the steel workers is given as one cause. In addition the manufacturers claim that the cost of production in every way is much greater than a year ago.

FOUND IN THE SPEY.

London, Aug. 28.—Lady Smith, wife of Sir Archibald Smith, Master of the Rolls since 1900, was found dead to-day in the River Spey, Scotland. It is not known whether she was drowned, or whether she was married to Sir Archibald Smith in 1867.

A LONDON BURGLAR.

Woodstock, Ont., Aug. 27.—William Morgan, the young man charged with burglary in London, Ingersoll and Woodstock, received his hearing before Judge Finkle to-day, and was given five years in the Kingston Penitentiary. Thomas Dalton, the man who turned King's evidence, was let go on suspended sentence.

IT WAS JOHN MURRY'S LEG.

Poughkeepsie, Aug. 27.—The man, whose severed leg was carried on a cart truck of the Montreal express to that city and back to New York between Saturday night and Monday morning, was John Murry, aged 40 years, a laborer, of Castleton. He was struck by the train Saturday night and was instantly killed.

CRUSHED BY THE BUMPERS.

New Hamburg, Aug. 27.—Conductor John Morrison, of No. 6 regular G. T. R. passenger train, going east from London to Toronto at 9:07, was severely injured at the station here by the bumpers. He was examining the air brake couplings, when the train backed up. He moved backward, and raising his head was caught between the iron bumpers and severely crushed, rendering him unconscious. He was left here under medical attendance. The report is that his injury is probably fatal.

TORPEDO BOATS

The First Naval Manoeuvres Ever Attempted on the Station.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 27.—Admiral Bedford has ordered a torpedo boat attack upon the fleet on Thursday night. During the day the ships will leave port, and during the night will attempt to enter the harbor. An attack will be made on all the vessels by the torpedo boats. The torpedo boat destroyer Quail will also take part. The manoeuvres will be the first of the kind attempted here. All the vessels of the fleet will be engaged by the attacking force, and it is the intention to bring every gun into use.

The torpedo boats will be lying in wait in one of the coves for the enemy, and will suddenly pounce upon the war vessels. The admiral and officers will have no previous knowledge of the whereabouts of the small fleet.

The torpedo boat destroyer Quail will act as an active guard, and, aided by the searchlights on the cruisers, will endeavor to locate the enemy.

CHINESE ARE READY TO SIGN PROTOCOL.

London, Aug. 28.—Li Hung Chang has notified the ministers of the powers that the Chinese plenipotentiaries are now authorized to sign the protocol, says a despatch to the Times. "Li," dated yesterday, "and has requested them to fix a date for the signing. An edict concerning the ratification of the protocol is to be issued among the ministers to-day. Two other edicts are still required to complete the protocol."

Berlin, August 27.—The Cologne Volks Zeitung reports the massacre of six Christians at Ku-Ja, China.

PHILADELPHIA COUNSEL FOR SCHLEY.

Philadelphia, August 27.—The Record to-morrow will say: Albert R. O'Brien, a prominent member of the Philadelphia bar, has been called on by Schley in the coming investigation at Washington. Last Thursday Mr. O'Brien was in Washington in consultation with Schley's counsel and was particularly assisted in the preparation of the brief for the court of inquiry.

During the late '90s Mr. O'Brien occupied the post of judge-advocate of the West India fleet, and in 1899 was stationed at Annapolis, where Schley was lieutenant commander. A warm friendship developed between the two men. Mr. O'Brien resigned from the navy in 1875 and took up the practice of law in Philadelphia.
