I can distinctly remember on the first Sunday in Advent, 1825, hearing the officiating clergyman at St. Mary Woolnoth give out sonorously when reading the first lesson "like a lodge in a garden of cowcumbers," and my dear old rector, Julius Charles Hare, twenty years later adopted the same pronunciation, saying at table, 'Obleege by passing the cowcumber." "Vilets," as a dissyllable for violets, was equally common among people of good education.
