THE BANNER'S "APOLOGY."

Experience should count for something, and it invariably does improve persons who are bright and intelligent enough to profit by it. After the repeated practice which the Banner has had from time to time in the art of "backing up," it was at least expected that they would be able by this time, to compose a better and more complete apology than the one which was evidently intended to be tendered to Ald. Potter last Wednesday evening.

A few days ago the Banner was induced to publish an article concerning certain members of the Council Board, which was taken exception to by Ald. Potter, who was of the opinion that the article in question reflected upon the characters of every alderman at the Board with the exception of Ald. Westman. In a commendable and clear-cut speech Ald. Potter gave the Banner a severe drubbing—the kind which humiliates and stings a newspaper that aspires to any prestige whatever in a community.

Two days later the Banner, evidently touched upon a tender spot, thought that it was "up to them" to say something, and an editorial was published under the caption, "Ald. Potter's Remarks." In the course of that editorial it was stated:

"There was no intention on the part of the News of hinting at devious methods; nor was that done. The News would ask its readers if they have determined why this journal should be attacked as having cast doubt on the honesty of any alderman."

What injured innocents! In order to assist the readers of the Banner in "determining" this point, it might be well to indicate a few excerpts from the article complained of by Ald. Potter. This is how it read:

"IN SOME WAY, it is alleged, Mr. Read secured the support of the majority of the aldermen for a proposition to accept his tender. To say the least, declare the critics, THE WHOLE THING LOOKS SUSPICIOUS. The cause for the sudden change of mind will have to be something more satisfying to the ratepayers than the excuse made by some of those approached as to their reason for acting as they did."

And so all of this "wise" criticism, coming after the words of the heading, "Why did the City Council do a flip flop act?" and the mysterious insinuation of the whole article, was "not intended to hint at devious methods!" Then why was the article published at all? Did the Banner wish to convey the impression that the Council was going to resolve itself into a circus troupe and do stunts on the trapeze and horizontal bar, and charge admission into the Council Chamber? What did they mean by saying that the whole thing looked "suspicious"? What was the "some way" in which they stated that Mr. Read had "secured the support of the Council." Why do they in their last editorial throw out the insinuation thrust about the ratepayers who "may" vote for Ald. Potter again?

The Banner is not through with the apology business yet—that is if they wish to make the amende honorable to Ald. Potter, and regain a portion of the public respect which they have lost through the publication of their "flip-flop" article.

Shipwreck Heroine Swam Two Hours, Saving Another; Had Never Swam Before

Periland, Ore., July 25.—Miss Maybelle Watson, of Berkeley, Cal., the 16-year-old heroine who supported a drowning woman for two hours after the wreck of the steamship Columbia, arrived here on the steamer George W. Elder last evening.

Miss Watson, with three companions, succeeded in entering a lifeboat, but it had hardly been lowered when the Columbia sank and they were thrown into the water.

"When I came to the surface," said Miss Watson, "some persons were singing 'Nearer My God to Thee' and other hymns. I had never swam a stroke before, but somehow I had confidence enough to try. I had gone but a little way when a woman rose beside me and caught me around the neck. I had to support her with one arm and swim with the other. Several men swam past us, but would offer no assistance."

"I struggled alone as best I could until I was picked up more than two hours after the collision by Third Officer Hawse and his boat. I insisted that he take the woman in first, which he did, and soon had me in the boat. The people in the boat thought she was dead and so did the doctors in the San Pedro, but to oblige Mr. Hawse they made a determined effort to save her, and succeeded."

The woman whom Miss Watson saved is Miss Emma Griesse, of Cleveland, O.
