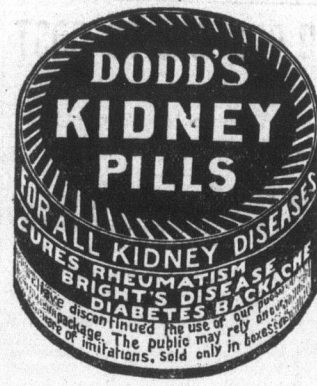

Railway Shops Burned.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Dec. 1.—The workshops of the Prince Edward Island Railway here were destroyed by fire yesterday morning. The buildings included the car shop, the machine shop and blacksmith shop, the two cars partly built, and all the machinery and tools. The other buildings were gutted. The works employed about 120 men. The buildings were of wood and of no great value. The loss is roughly estimated at \$65,000.

Porte Will Be Obstinate.

Athens, Dec. 1.—Persons arriving from Mytilene yesterday say they are convinced that the Porte will hold out until the powers occupy Smyrna. The report that Mytilene is in a state of absolute tranquillity and that the Ottoman flag flies from the Government House.

For a Lock Canal.

Washington, Dec. 1.—President Roosevelt has decided in favor of the construction of a lock canal across the isthmus at a level of 30 feet. This is the type of canal recommended by the five American engineers who signed the minority report of the board of consulting engineers. The foreign engineers, a majority, favored a sea-level canal.

Warehousemen to Protest.

Montreal, Dec. 1.—Warehousemen and others using bonded warehouses in Montreal have appointed a committee to wait on Hon. William Paterson with the object of protesting against the increased charges, which the Government intends to put into effect on Jan. 1.
