GERMAN LOSS **ARE STUPENDOUS**

Their Casualty Lists Frequently Reveal that Entire Regiments Are Decimated.

andon, Nov. 20.—The appalling extent of the German losses is revealed by a perusal of the official casualty by a perusal of the official casualty lists issued daily by the German Government for the information of families, although newspapers are prohibited from reproducing them. The outstanding facts in these lists are the enormous gaps in certain regiments and the frequency with which entire battalions are wiped out, the remarkably small proportion of officers lost, and the great number of volunteers killed.


The latest lists available cover the losses for October. For Prussla, Wurttemberg, Bavaria, and Saxony there are over 200,000 names. It will be recalled that at the beginning of November the Prussian losses alone were estimated to be slightly over two million.

The lists for October 23 alone give ten thousand casualties. The Prussian list includes nine-regiments of October 23 alone give ten thousand casualties. The Prussian list includes nine-regiments of Grenadiers and Fusiliers of the regular infantry, 31 regiments of reserves and 21 of the Landwehr, and many from the field artillery.
