THE STAGEDRIVER'S STORY.

A THANKSGIVING SKETCH.

'Yes, I've driven a stage for forty odd

year amongst these mountains, and I did

sort of hate to give it up and settle down

to keepin' summer boarders. But rheu-

hold of him; and as for holdin' six horses

in with a lame shoulder, it can't be done.

I'm some better now, and I do drive folk

up an' down Washington once in a while,

but regular stagin' of it I'll give up.

Railroads too has set in 'most every where,

so'there ain't any great call for coach-

men'n up and down the Glen.'

'You must have had a good many ad-

ventures,' I suggested.

'Adventures! Land! What could hap-

pen to a feller drivin' along the road and

mindin' of his business steady?

Evidently I had been too direct in my

'You didn't drive all winter, I suppose?

'No, you better believe I didn't! I
