Paper Making and the Egyptians.

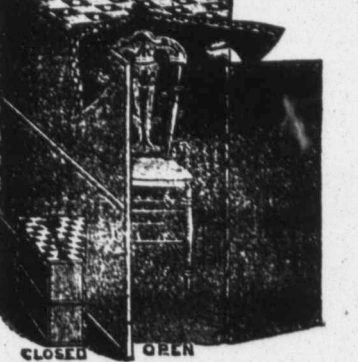
