"I do not deny that Dr. Miller and I were together much of the time," she said, "but there was never anything wrong in our friendship. My husband came into the house Sunday evening when Dr. Miller and I were sitting in the parlor. He seized a hatchet from under the lounge and said: I am going to kill you. Then I ran from the room and a few minutes later heard the shots.

While fixing a net on a boat at Wallaceburg on Wednesday, Frank Deloney, aged 65, fell off the craft, and was drowned in the Sydenham River. A son recovered the body. He leaves a widow and nine children.

Y., July 15 .- Evelyn Nesbitt Thaw was at hand and ready to testify for the state which is opposing her husband's release from the Matteawan Asylum for the Criminal Insane, when the fifth day of the hearing on Harry K. Thaw's mental condition was begun before Justice Mills in the Supreme Court here to-day, with Dr. O. M. Meyer, of New York, on the witness stand. The usual curious crowd filled all available space in the court room.

Dr. Meyer testified that he saw Thaw first in the White Plains jail on Oct. 8, 1908, and discussed with him at that time the episodes included in a hypothe-

time the episodes included in a hypothetical question which the witness had prepared on which to base an opinion of the prisoner's sanity. On subsequent visits to the White Plains Jail, and in Matteawan Asylum, the physician talked freely with Thaw, he said, and got him to tell the story of his boyhood days.

Deputy Attorney General Clark continually objected to Dr. Meyer's summarizing his conversations with Thaw and insisted on the witness giving Thaw's exact words. He was sustained in his objections by the court and the witness had to go over his testimony several times before answers were elicited, which were allowed to remain on the record. the record.

Dr. Meyer related a conversation upon one occasion when Thaw told him he feared he was going to have typoid fever and suggested that his rooms in the jail should be cooled off with twenty tons of ice.
