Mrs. Annie Riley nee Buchanan, grandmother of Gen. F. McWilliam of Newcastle, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John M. Brown, at Sunny Brae, on April 1st. Deceased was in her 95th year, having been born on July 12, 1822, at Shediac. Her husband, Edward Riley, whom she married on June 1st 1842, died on January 30th 1879, aged 73 years. Five of deceased's 17 children survive her: Barbara, wife of Major John M. Brown of Sunny Brae; Letitia (Mrs. John Bulmer) Cherryfield John Riley, Sunny Brae; Tweed Riley Chinoque, Mass.; Eliza (Mrs. Edmund Clegg), East Hampton, Mass. Fifty one grandchildren and 54 great grandchildren also survive her. Deceased, until taken bedfast six weeks before her death, was very active in Red Cross work, having knitted 116 pairs of socks for the Moncton Red Cross branch.
