## PLS FOR ONTARIO

the Varieties Recommended for  
Home Orchards.

THE home orchard should pro-  
vide high-class dessert and  
cooking apples throughout  
the entire apple season, or  
the middle of July until the  
following spring. It is quite easy to  
select varieties for any part of old  
Ontario which will do this satisfac-  
torily. The varieties selected should  
be into bearing early, should pro-  
duce annually, and should be free  
from diseases of all kinds, so that they may be handled  
with a minimum of expense and care.

Throughout this article the varieties  
mentioned are listed in the order of  
season of use, so that intend-  
ing planters may be guided in mak-  
ing a selection to cover the season.

In order to simplify the selection  
of varieties for any given district a  
classification of the most desirable  
varieties is given herewith based on  
their relative hardiness, which is  
their ability to withstand cold win-  
ters successfully.

Hardest:—Transparent, Duchesne,  
McIntosh, Hibernia, Crab-  
apple, and can be grown suc-  
cessfully even further north.

Second Hardest:—Aunt Sarah, An-  
derson, St. Lawrence, Wealthy,  
Liberty, Snow, Scarlet Pippin, Wolf  
Golden Russet.

Third Hardest:—Blenheim, Tol-  
son, Spy.

Fourth Hardest:—Gravenstein, Four-  
star, Stark, Greening, Ben Davis.

Fifth Hardest:—These varieties  
are more or less tender and thrive  
best south of a line drawn from  
Sault Ste. Marie to Brantford and Goderich.

Sixth Hardest:—These varieties  
are tender and thrive best in the  
Erie counties, although they  
are not entirely satisfactory even  
in the most southerly counties of  
Ontario.

The varieties which come into  
bearing earliest (about the first of  
August) are Duchesne, Wealthy, Mil-  
lars, Wagner and Ontario. Most  
of the other varieties listed should  
begin bearing about the second of  
September, but Blenheim and Spy are  
exceptions to this, and fre-  
quently do not produce fruit until  
about fifteen to eighteen years  
after planting.

The varieties which are least sub-  
ject to apple scab are Duchesne, Rib-  
ston, Blenheim, Hibernia, Baldwin  
and Russet. —Prof. J. W. Crow, O. A.  
College, Guelph.

Potato Rot From Spreading.  
When harvesting potatoes, more  
especially in damp seasons, it is es-  
sential to pick them over and discard  
specimens that are diseased, par-  
ticularly those that show any indica-  
tion of rot. If this is not done, the  
disease is liable to spread through  
the whole mass during storage. If  
it is dry rot (Fusarium) or black  
and wet rot (B. solanaceae) or  
light (Phytophthora infestans)  
has been noticed in the growing crop,  
they may be taken for granted that a  
percentage of the tubers will be in-  
fected. These diseases may be found  
at all stages of development in the  
tubers produced by an affected plant.  
These are the diseases most liable to  
spread, to a greater or less extent,  
through a pile or bag of stored tubers  
any of them are affected at the  
time they are stored away. Conse-  
quently, the greatest care should be  
taken when harvesting a crop that  
has shown diseases when growing in  
the field.

These diseases show themselves on  
the tubers, either as a dry mold  
rot or a wet slimy rot, or as brown  
blackish discolorations. On some  
the diseased condition may be  
easily advanced and conse-  
quently easily noticed. On other  
the disease may be of recent  
development and not easily seen.

Where practicable it is desirable  
to pick out all tubers in which the  
disease is readily seen and then to  
wash the remainder either in a tub  
of water or by turning a hose on to  
them. This washing not only re-  
moves any soil that may be sticking  
to them, but it intensifies the discolor-  
ations produced by the disease, and so  
makes it comparatively easy mat-  
ter to pick out those tubers which  
are only lightly affected. After wash-  
ing, the undesirable specimens should  
be removed and the remainder  
laid out in a thin layer to dry  
before being stored away. —Prof.  
H. Jones, Ontario Agricultural  
College, Guelph.

Fertile Soils for Alfalfa.  
Alfalfa will not thrive on poor  
soils, or that which is deficient in  
phosphorus. Even soils that are moderately  
fertile and produce good average  
crops will not produce profit-  
able crops of alfalfa unless first limed  
and then planted in sweet clover,  
which should be turned under while  
green and juicy in the fall or  
summer.

### The Makers of Canada

The earliest settlers in Canada were roused by the Call of the Church to develop a noble and useful citizenship. Canada nobly stood the great trial.

### The Menace of To-day

This conflict is ended. Now comes another test. Not only in Canada, but all over the world, sectional and class struggles for material rewards and for mastery threaten the present basis of Society. The vision of spiritual values gained in the War is in peril of being forgotten. The supremacy of sacrifice, the nobility of service, the reality and glory of the Unseen and Eternal, the promises of Christ, these were the things by which we lived during the War. Now there is great danger that they may fade from view, giving place to selfishness and the love of ease.

The great non-Christian peoples of the world comprise two-thirds of the human race. They are mastering our modern scientific knowledge, and if they remain Pagan may yet turn it to our destruction. Paganism stands for the supremacy of Might, the very ideal

we fought and conquered in more than four years of war.

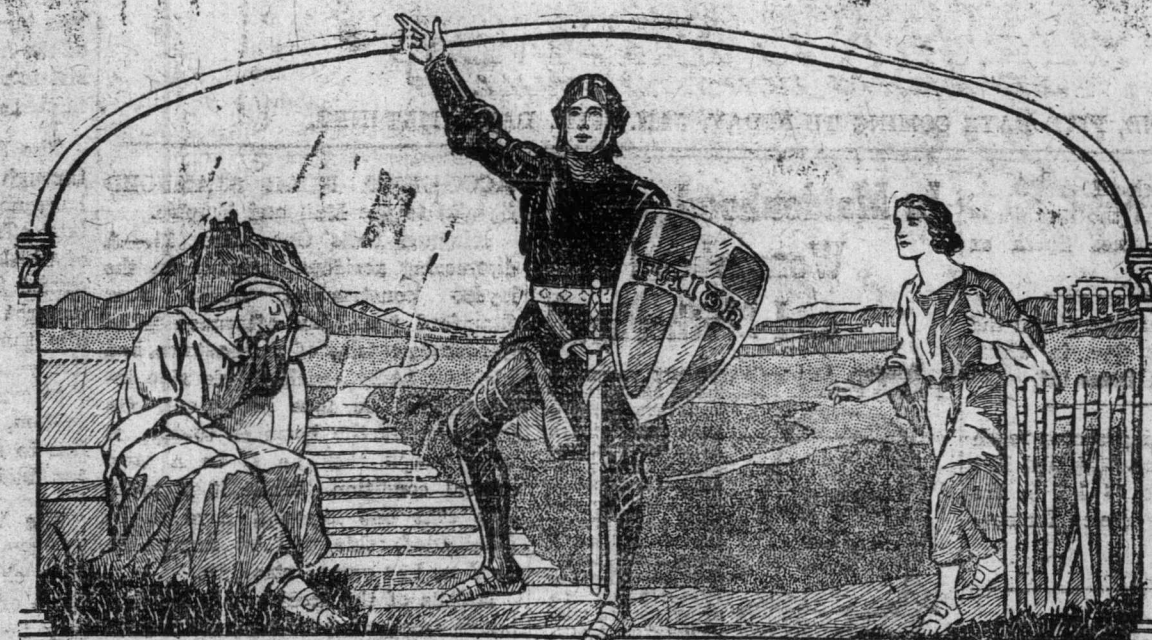
### Victory only through Christ
