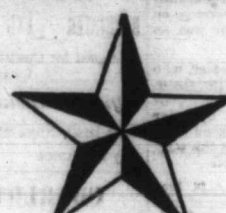

In 1854 Don Bosco presided at a retreat which was attended by many gentlemen of Turin.

It was evening. All were assembled for night prayers; Don Bosco, when his voice suddenly ceased, while at the same time his gaze seemed fixed on something above the altar.

Presently he sighed, cast down his eyes once more and endeavored to continue the prayer. But all in vain he could not remember it, either in Italian or Latin. Finally, he concluded with the sign of the cross, the fingers of his hands crossed, and he resumed the prayer.

The following morning the young ladies surrounded him and began to rally him pleasantly on the incident of the night before.

At length to one or two of the more serious who asked him the cause of his distraction Don Bosco replied:

"At the moment when I was about to say in Italian I saw two bright points of light above the altar. On one of those points I read 'Heresy,' and on the other 'Heretic,' and as they seemed to float in the air to the other end of the church my eyes followed them with the greatest concern. They rested over the head of two persons whom I recognized perfectly in the gloom of the church by the light of these points of flame.
