CALGARY'S FAIR

OPENED WITH GOOD PROSPECTS.
Good Attendance on Opening Day—
Indian Pageant Portrays Signing
of Treaty With Southern Indians,
Thirty-seven Years Ago.

Calgary, July 1.—Calgary's fair opened under most promising conditions. That it will break all records is assured. The thousands of out-of-town people who are attending will take home good reports of the exhibits and attractions. The attendance today was 26,000. Hon. P. W. G. Haultain opened the exhibition this afternoon after a few preliminary remarks.

THE FAIR WAS OFFICIALLY OPENED IN THE presence of the ten thousand people in the Grand Stand by P. W. G. Haultain, ex-premier of the Northwest Territories. In the party with him were Premier Sifton, Attorney-General Mitchell, Provincial Secretary McLean, R. B. Bennett, M.P.P., I. S. G. Van-der-Smissen, president of the exhibition association, Mr. Markham, dairy commissioner; M. S. McCarthy, and others.

Haultain's Speech.
Hon. Mr. Haultain spoke briefly and to the point. His speech was cheered to the echo by the tremendous crowd that listened to it and then broke forth in a chorus of applause. He took up the detail work of announcing the attractions and the big fair was on.

New York, N.Y., June 29.—An attachment was laid today upon the wireless stations of Elmer E. Burlingame's \$2,000,000 Radio Telephone Company in the metropolitan tower and on the roof number 65 Broadway, because of its failure to pay a debt of \$1,300, alleged to be due for apparatus.

WILL INSPECT WATER TANKS.
Toronto Takes Action as Result of Montreal Catastrophe.

Toronto, June 29.—A by-law authorizing the city architect to inspect water tanks installed on buildings for fire protection and ordering that in future such tanks be located at the top of elevator shafts, will be introduced in the city council by the fire and light committee. The action is taken as a direct result of the disaster at Montreal and the resultant enquiry which showed that the tanks were not inspected by the city. The provision that they be located above the elevator shafts is because of the added strength of the supports.

DAY OF CONFERENCES
ON RAILWAY DISPUTES

Nothing Results from Negotiations Between Railways and Men, Although Compromise is Now a Possibility—Conferences Are Amicable.

Montreal, June 28.—This was a day of conference between the representatives of the Trainmen and Conductors' Unions, and the Vice-Presidents of the Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk. Apparently nothing was gained as the fact that on all sides the principle of further conference was recognized, which gave hope that such discussion might lead to an eventual settlement without open hostilities.

TO MEET AGAIN.
The most significant feature of these conferences was the fact that it was promised that the men and officials of both roads would meet again when some further grounds for settlement might be arrived at.

HOPE FOR ADJUSTMENT.
"We met the representatives of the Trainmen and Conductors' Unions," said Vice-President Fishback of the Grand Trunk, "for the first time since the wage trouble arose, some six months ago, and discussed the matter thoroughly. The men presented their demands and views, and the company expressed its own. While we could not accept the proposition made by the men, nor would they accede to the views we expressed, the discussion was carried on in a friendly manner and I have every hope that an amicable settlement will be eventually arrived at. The matter is still under discussion. I can say no further, save that we have not arrived at an impasse yet."

VICE-PRESIDENT STATEMENT.
Vice-President D. McNeill today took charge of the negotiations on behalf of the Canadian Pacific. At the close of the meeting he was more reluctant than Mr. Fishback.

STORMS WRECK VESSELS.
Valparaiso, Chile, June 28.—Storm in the south and along the coast have done much damage. Several vessels have been wrecked. The German steamer, Irmingard, is ashore of Corral and is believed to be a total loss. The crew was saved.

PREMIER SCOTT

VISITED EDMONTON SATURDAY.
Premier of Saskatchewan Spent Day in Edmonton—Crop Prospects Promising in Sister Province.

"Drought has affected the crops of Saskatchewan only in a few localities," said Hon. Walter Scott, premier of Saskatchewan, who arrived in Edmonton this morning on the C.N.R. to a representative of the Bulletin, when questioned as to crop outlook in the central prairie province.

GOULDTHRITE SAID
TO HAVE SUICIDED

Missing Superintendent of Printing Bureau at Ottawa Reported to Have Jumped Into Detroit River—Report Believed by Police to Throw Police Off Scent.

Ottawa, June 28.—The report from Detroit that Frank Gouldthrite, the missing superintendent of the Government Printing Bureau, committed suicide by jumping into the river at Detroit, created a definite sensation here; while the opinion of the average man on the street, not acquainted with the missing official, is that Gouldthrite and some of his friends have been putting up a game to make the police believe that he has really committed suicide.

MUCH RAILWAY CONSTRUCTION.
Premier Scott stated that an unusual amount of railroad construction was being proceeded with this year in Saskatchewan. North of Battleford the C.N.R. were laying steel on a forty-mile section between Edmonton and Regina.

IS BURNED TO DEATH

It is Alleged That He Was Locked up on Excursion Boat, Which Was Burned to Water's Edge After 1,500 Passengers Had Been Landed Safely.

LACROSSE, Wis., June 28.—Unable to find a trace of Jack Plein, of Lansing, Iowa, said to have been burned to death while a prisoner in the hold of the excursion steamer, J. S. which was burned to the water's edge on Saturday night, near Victoria, Wis., after 1,500 passengers were safely landed, Mayor Dunlevy, of Lansing, has asked the officials of Houston county to investigate with a view to placing the blame on the slightest injury to British subjects. Transactions like that were better carried out by men of the highest character.
