## A Serious Matter.

This forenoon a resident of the West End was up before the Judge in the Police Court charged with purchasing liquor for a man who is on the black list. A son of the drinker of the spirits laid the information which led to the prosecution. Suppl. Grimes conducted the case for the crown and Mr. Higgins defended. The accused was convicted and was fined \$50 or 3 months. This is the first offence of the kind which has occurred since last year and the penalty inflicted should serve as a warning to others who may be tempted to take such a risk in future.

## More Diphtheria.

A child named King, of Duckworth Street, developed diphtheria yesterday and was removed to hospital. This is the first case to occur in the city for nearly a week. Inspector Lawlor visited Tonsall Road yesterday and fumigated the Turner residence. All the patients in hospital are doing well. Mount Cashel is under quarantine and no hawk is allowed to be sold from the institution up to the present. The institution has been thoroughly fumigated and disinfected.

Yesterday there were various rumors about as regards the sealing steamer. Last night had it that the Bloodhound was at Harbor Grace with 22,000 old and young seals, the weight of 30,000, and the Southern Cross was reported at loaded. Nevertheless to say not a word of truth attached to either report.
