Observed at the House.

The address of Mr. Stone, yesterday, was one that reflected no credit upon the interference of the Government on marine questions. We can endorse the words of the speaker that party politics are too rife. The Minister's able speech yesterday was worthy of attention, but some of the Government members did not like the tenor of all his remarks, and figuratively some were shaking in their shoes.

The Minister of Mines still absents himself. It is amusing to note the contradictory remarks of the Premier. He says, Mr. Cuff is not eligible to sit in his seat in the House, but he is able to retain his ministryship and also his pensioner-sitting as well as his Executive seat. Surely in our "Silent Doctor" we have found the miracle of the age, and more honor is yet to come to our native Isle.

It is quite in accord with the doings of the Government to note that no signals or life-saving apparatus have yet been arranged for the protection of ships along the Southern Shore. Are they waiting for another repetition of the "Florist disaster"? It is but another instance of that lack of respect which the Government shows to sensible recommendations. "Consideration is needed," is the invariable reply, but the answer now is being prepared by the voters of the country. "We have considered and out you go!" So be it.—M.P.

Railway Notes.

The express which left St. John's last Tuesday was held up at Clarendville, owing to the storm of Wednesday referred to by the St. John's press as a mid-winter snowstorm. It is not correct, however, as stated by a section of the press of the capital, that like conditions "extended from the city to Port aux Basques." Spring-like weather prevailed at this part of the line.

The railway contract calls for a fifty pound rail, and the heaviest engine to weigh thirty tons exclusive of tender. The axle load in daily practice on the Newfoundland railway, says Engineer Hall, is eleven tons, while that of the rotary snow plow is seventeen tons; English practice for similar roadbed would be eight tons. Engineer Hall in his evidence at the Mount Moriah railway accident enquiry, recommended the laying of an eighty pound rail, the widening of the roadbed, better ditching and more ballast.

On the 8th inst., we received official assurance that the regular cross-country express and mail service would be resumed the following day. Since then, however, we have averaged something like a train a week, while the Kyle is still making Placentia a port of call, and the latest mail we have received from Canada is a week old. Passengers from the coast for Canada and United States have been delayed over a week at a time and some have had to abandon their proposed trip and return to their homes from Port aux Basques. Every effort, however, seems to be made to facilitate the foreign mail and passenger traffic for the capital.—Western Star April 23.
