CAPE RACE, To-day.

To-Day's Messages.

BLOODY WAR RAGING.

WATERFORD, Sept. 20.
A hugh battle was waged on Sunday morning at the Police Barracks, 12 miles from Waterford, where a large party of armed men attacked the police. There was a heavy exchange of rifle fire, but the police held off the attackers until they attracted the attention of the military station six miles distant, by means of signal-lights, when soldiers arrived and beat off the besiegers.

OTHER CASUALTIES.

DUBLIN, Sept. 20.
Civilians this morning ambuscaded a military lorry escorted by ten soldiers in Church Street and a battle ensued in which two civilians and two soldiers were wounded. In the report it is said that one of the soldiers later died from his injuries. Military reinforcements arrived and drove off the assailants two of whom are said to have been captured.

ELECTION CERTAIN.

PARIS, Sept. 20.
M. Millerand's acceptance as a candidate for the Presidency has virtually solved the presidential crisis, as it is conceded by all in the Chamber of Deputies and Senate that his election is a foregone conclusion, as he will receive more than seven hundred votes. No other candidate is entering the field.

SEISMIC SHOCKS.

VICTORIA, B.C., Sept. 20.
A well recorded seismic disturbance took place to-day. It left a record for two and a half hours on the seismograph on Gonzales Observatory, commencing at six forty-nine

o'clock in the morning. Supt. Denison places the distance at 1600 miles, probably in the Aleutian Islands or northern Mexico.

IN THE NEAR EAST.

WARSAW, Sept. 20.
The Russians are concentrating a heavy fire along the Nieman River, beyond the Polish northeastern frontier and preparations for an offensive, which is expected to be within a few days, are being made, according to military attaches who have been at the front recently.

BELFAST MOBS FIGHT.

BELFAST, Sept. 20.
A rival mob clashed in the East End of the city last night, and fought with stones until the police arrived and dispersed them by firing. Last night was the last in which the Curfew Law was effective.

SOMETHING TO SHOW.

PARIS, Sept. 21.
The ninth session of the Council of the League of Nations adjourned yesterday, having smoothed out many difficulties between four nations, which once threatened war. Through its action, Poland and Lithuania agree to an immediate suspension of hostilities pending a settlement of the dispute which both agree to accept. Finland obviated its difficulties with the Council by accepting its report on the Aland Island question, with reservations. It is pointed out by League officials that although neither Finland or Sweden are legally bound to accept the Council's decision, they are morally amenable.

COLOR TROUBLE IN CHICAGO.

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.
Squads of policemen, armed with rifles, rescued three negroes from St. Gabriel's Church, South Side, last night, where they were besieged by a mob of one thousand. The negroes were alleged to have killed a white man, Charles Barrett, who went to the rescue of an insulted white girl. Race riots were feared.

STILL ALIVE.

LONDON, To-day.
MacSweeney passed a restless night in Brixton prison, and was very weak this morning, according to a bulletin of the Irish Self-Determination League.

WHERE ARE THE INDIANS?

WINNIPEG, Sept. 21.
A herd of Bison, numbering over one thousand, said to be the last on the North American continent, has been discovered roaming in the MacKenzie River basin.

NO GUES.

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.
Federal and police authorities to-day, were admittedly as far as ever from the solution of the mystery surrounding the explosion that spread death and destruction in Wall Street Thursday last. Edwin P. Fischer has been admitted to Bellevue Hospital for observation. Alexander Brailovsky, Russian journalist, has been unconditionally released.

SANGUINARY RETALIATION.

DUBLIN, Sept. 21.
Auxiliary police forces last night wrecked the town of Balbriggan near here, in retaliation for the shooting of two police officers. Two civilians were shot dead and several persons were wounded. Many houses were set on fire and the largest hosiery factory in Ireland was destroyed. This morning the town is in terror and streams of refugees are abandoning the place.
