Coceanut Pie is made the same way, adding 1 cup of shredded cocoanut, and using only 2 eggs.

Pumpkin Pie 2 cups stewed and strained pumpkin 2 cups rich milk or cream 4 cup brown or granulated sugar

Mix pumpkin with milk, sugar, well-beaten eggs, gin-ger, salt, cinnamon, and beat 2 minutes. Pour into pie tin which has been lined with pastry. Place in hot oven for 15 minutes, then reduce heat and bake 45 minutes in mod-erate oven. To bring out fla-vor of pumpkin it must be very well baked.


