

IF DRIVERS WOULD GIVE MINT TO POLICE.

Any careful driver will find at least a half dozen drivers during the course of an afternoon's spin who ought to be reported to the authorities. The police are seldem in sight when the flagrant violations occur; and the violater does as he pleases most of the time, safe in the belief that while other motorists will swear vengeand

on him they will not report him. This is an unfortunate state of afins. The motoriet who feels that the streets of automobile law-breakers makes a note of a violator's license number; but coming to think of the inconvenience he will be put to in testifying against the violator decides to let the matter drop. It simply means that the lawuntil he has caused some serious-or perhaps-fatal accident. Most licenses are revoked after the damage is

This is all the more reason why the country would profit by a system whereby all motorists would be free to report any act of deliberate violation without being obliged to appear against the law-breaker and be unnecessarily inconvenienced. The acthat charge is a matter for the police, or the officials, but the average drivor can help materially by advising the police whom to watch.

If motorists would send in a brief report of drivers they think bear watching the police would soon know where to direct their efforts. If ten motorists reported the same driver it wouldn't be long before that driver would get what he deserved-and before he caused great damage.

GRASP LEVER FIRMLY.

The gear shift lever of a car is capable of an annoying kick back if the gears are carelessly shifted. A careless shift means one in which the gears trip over each other before their teeth actually mesh, during which process the gear shift lever will vibrate enough to give the relaxed fingers of the driver a bad kick and perhaps injure one of them. Whether your shifting is good or bad, it's safer to grasp the lever firmly.

SPEED UP MOTOR TO GO INTO NEUTRAL.

When you want to shift into neutral, either to coast or to shift to another speed, always speed up a little. If this is not done the gears will "stick" a little, even to a point of resisting a change until the car has slowed down almost to a standstill. When the engine is pulling the driving gears too vigorously, or when the car steelf is exerting a varying force, the pressure on the gears at their teeth surfaces is not equal. This causes "sticking" and the difficulty of pulling them out of mesh. Speeding up the engine a little will assally tend to equalize these pressures.
