Supreme Court.

THE KING VS. JAMES WHITEFORD MCNEILLY.

When the Court resumed the hearing in the above matter yesterday afternoon, Mr. B. Dunfield resumed his argument on the status of the Grand Jury. Some of the quotations he used were taken from authorities he procured at Halifax, and left them for the consideration of their Lordships.

Mr. Emerson who, with Mr. H. A. Winter, is Crown Counsel in the case, was heard in reply and intimated that he would briefly confine himself to the new points raised by Mr. Dunfield, as the others had been previously disposed of.

As to the matter of Tenece Cooper serving on the jury when the summons was made out in the name of Francis Cooper, he had no doubt that this was merely a clerical error, as the names are so much alike that the mistake could easily have been made. The summons was served to the correct address and the other particulars of the man were correct. The same thing he thought applied in the matter of Wilbert Chancey.

In the matter of Edward Perez, Archdale S. Lewis and Joseph Perez it was evidently discovered after the list was compiled that these names were wrongly listed and the correction made; in all particulars, these men corresponded with the Jury list.

As to Thomas Jones, who is one of the Grand Jury, being ineligible because he is a customs officer, Mr. Emerson quoted authority to show that the fact of a juror summoned, being a civil servant was sufficient grounds for such a man claiming exemption from serving on such a jury, but in itself it is not sufficient to make him ineligible to serve. Mr. Emerson then went on to quote extracts dealing with the drawing of Grand and Petit Jurors and the procedure in the case of Special Jurors. He then called Sheriff Blandford, who deposed that the cards have been kept in the usual place, since the drawing of the jury and no one has access to them outside of the sub-Sheriff and himself. The Grand Jury was drawn prior to the comparison made on Friday last, but the Jurors in the Campbell and O'Reilly trials were drawn on Saturday and Monday last, respectively. Mr. Emerson then went on to quote further authority in support of his case, after which Court adjourned until this morning.

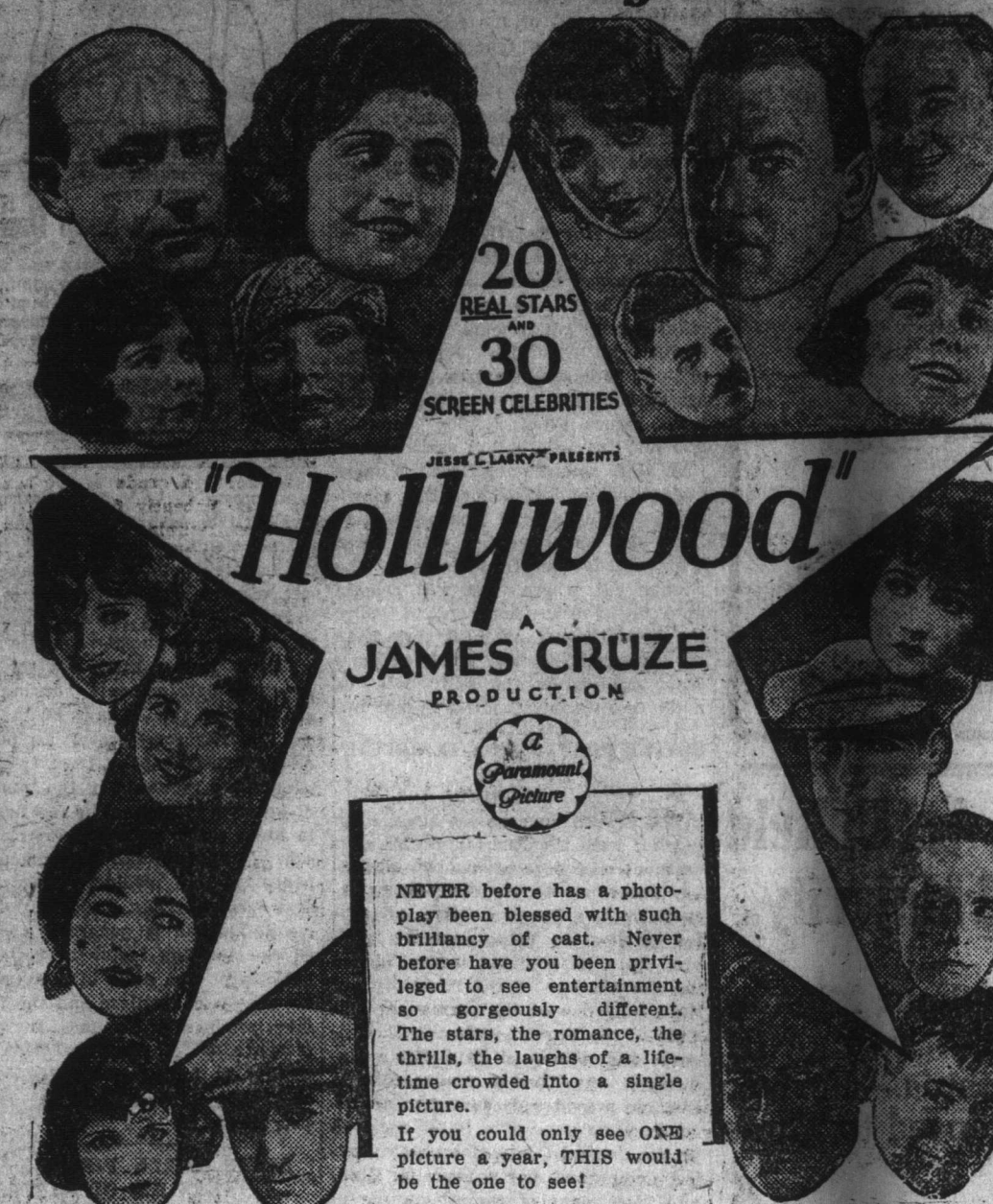
