THE TELESCOPE.

Edison's latest invention, the telescope, makes a permanent record of telephone conversations. To use it, the receiver of a regular desk telephone is removed from the hook and placed in a socket of the telescope. The user then takes up the receiver of the telephone, gives his call to the exchange, afterward starting and stopping the recording machine by two small buttons. Both sides of the conversation are recorded.

The wax record of the conversation may be kept for reference indefinitely. It will be seen how valuable such records of business conversations and agreements are, since they may be used as evidence in court, or otherwise employed to confirm contracts, orders and the like.

Running From a Fortune
