LOCATION FOR STRAWBERRIES

For strawberry growing, says Mr. J. E. Johnson, of Norfolk County, it is desirable to choose a piece of ground just loamy enough for good drainage, situated at a fairly high elevation, which location is warm and not subject to late frosts in blooming time. Good air drainage is very important in the growing of strawberries. While you may make a success certain years growing strawberries on low lands, you are also taking a great risk of frost at blooming time, except close to large bodies of water. The ideal soil is a good, humus-containing loam, which is well drained, with clay subsoil. The one condition of soil on which it is never advisable to plant strawberries is fresh-plowed old soil.
