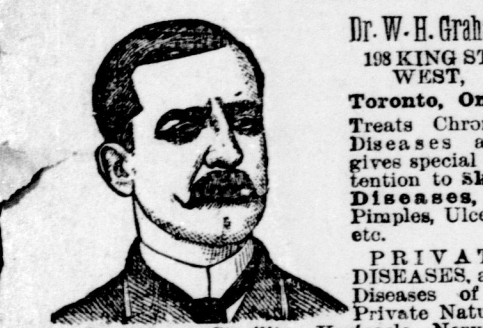

H. Dell, E. Paull and Chas. Crockett, and Head Master Liddicoat. The report of Mr. Liddicoat for the month of December showed the total enrollment of the six divisions to have been 323, with an average attendance of 306, or 95 per cent of the total number enrolled, a fact which the trustees considered was ample proof that the trust officer, Constable R. W. Ward, was carrying out his duties. By divisions the enrollment and attendance was as follows:
