Rome, May 7.-Mgr. Louis Galimberti, the well-known Roman prelate and diplomat, formerly Papal ambassador to Austria-Hungary, died at 1:20 this afternoon. He was born in 1838, acted as arbitrator between Germany and Spain in the dispute regarding the right of ownership to the Caroline Islands, and took an important part in the negotiations between Prussia and the Holy See which resulted in the abrogation of the notorious May Laws. The death of Mgr. Galimberti has greatly affected the Pope, to whom he was warmly devoted.

BRUSSELS STARTLED. Brussels, May 7.-A great sensation has been caused here by the arrest of M. Curtois, an ex-police official, for the murder of Mme. Herry, who was strangled in her house here. Courtois was identified as the man who, calling himself an artillery officer, sold the stolen bonds to a Brussels broker the morning after the crime. He admits his complicity in the murder. The news of his crime reached the ears of a woman whose husband was some time ago sentenced to a year's imprisonment for defamation of character in having accused Curtois, then on the police force, of complicity in the theft of the jewels of the Countess of Flanders in 1893. Madrid, May 7 .- Dispatches received here from Havana say that the American newspaper man, Hamilton, who was captured on board the Key West filibustering schooner Competitor, will be released, but that the other prisoners captured at the same time will be shot, in spite of the protests from Washington. The members of the Competitor fili-bustering expedition were caught in

the act of landing munitions of war on the coast of Cuba, and important papers, addressed to Gen. Maceo, were found in their possession. The Competitor was sighted a week ago by the war launch Mensajera, which signaled the schooner. No answer being made, a volley was fired. Some of the bullets entered a box of cartridges and an explosion occurred. The men in the boat fearing that their cargo contained dynamite, jumped into the sea and tried to swim The Mensajera sailors openashore. ed fire on the swimming men and killed two and wounded another, who drowned. Laborde, the leader of the expedition, reached shore and was arrested. His family is well known in Havana, and his father is a colonel in the Spanish militia. Laborde, Dr. Bedia, Milton and another prisoner were taken to Havana in irons. The schooner was confiscated.
