REID'S RULE HAS ENDED

The People of Newfoundland in Political Revolt.

Election Results in a Victory for the Liberals Under the Leadership of Robert Bond-No More Concessions to the Man Who Owns the Industries of the Island.

St. Johns, Nfld., Nov. 13 .- The parliamentary elections in Newfoundland have resulted in a victory for the Liberals, who claim 30 of the 36 seats in the new legislature. Their leader is Robert Bond, one of the leading statesmen of the colony, a man of wealth, and a bitter political antagonist of R. G. Reid, the "Czar of Newfoundland." Under Bond's leadership the younger and patriotic men have, after a two years' battle, unprecedented in the history of the island, overthrown the ministry controlled by the Reid interests. Reid, who personally controls every industry in the island, needs the consent of the government to enable him to incorporate his immense holdings into a limited liability company. The Bond ministry has refused its consent unless Reid would make important concessions demanded fourth. by the people. Reid refused, and the whole dispute became the sole issue in the election, which has just resulted favorably to the Bond ministry. The Liberal victory means the elimination of the Reid influence in the government and a more careful protection of the rights of the people.

GROWTH OF REID'S POWER. The overthrow of the Reid influence in Newfoundland is the culmination of a long continued and bitter agitation. R. G. Reid, although comparatively unknown to newspaper readers in the United States, is one of the colossal figures of the North American continent. As a result of his energy Reid today practically owns the Newfoundland railways, the steamer lines, wharves, docks, elevators, coal, copper and other mines, the pulp and lumber mills, and a large part of the land in the island. The control of all these many industries has given him a tremendous influence in Newfoundland politics, and his personal control of the government has been almost equal to his grasp on the commerce of the tsland. His overthrow, therefore, may be regarded as a victory for the peoas remarkable as it was unexpected.

BUILDS A RAILWAY SYSTEM. Reid went to Newfoundland in 1890 in response to an advertisement by its government calling for a contractor of reputed wealth to build a railroad. Reid was a contractor and a man of wealth. He built the first railway bridge across the Niagara River, the one at Eagle Pass, between Texas and Mexica, several on the Southern Pacific. the "Soo" bridge between Canada and the United States at Sault Ste. Marie, the Lachine bridge entering Montreal, and most of the largest structures over the rivers crossed by the Canadian Pacific He was a Scotchman by birth. 60 years ago, a stonemason by trade, a gold seeker in California and Australia, a bridge builder, and went to Newfoundland to become almost a czar. Reid contracted to build the railway wanted by Newfoundland. He agreed to construct 220 miles for \$15,600 a mile, and take his pay in 31/2 per cent bonds. He carried out his contract, and then Newfoundland entered on a long series of disasters. St. Johns was destroyed by fire, there were political convulsions, all the banks failed, business was demoralized, and the government treasury went bankrupt. During all these disasters Reid went on building railroads, advancing the cost from his own pocket. The government found itself unable to operate the roads, and appealed to Reid. Heconsented to operate the system for ten years, provided the government would give him in fee simple 5,000 acres of land for each mile. The govern-ment jumped at the offer, and signed The governover to him 2,750,000 acres of land. most of it apparently barren rock and brush-covered marsh. making and farming. He discovered mines, built factories, opened farms. GIVEN ENORMOUS CONTRACT. In 1898 came another period of distress for Newfoundland, and again Reid came to the rescue. He made a new contract, by which he undertook to operate at his own expense the railway system, then 650 miles in length,

for a term of 50 years. For the con-tract he paid into the Newfoundland treasury \$1,000,000 in cash, and receiv-ed a subsidy of 2,500 acres of land for-every mile of the railroad. At the end of the 50-year contract Reid was to pay the government \$6,000,000 addition-al, and the rallway was to become his own property.

By the same contract Reid also purchased the government telegraph sys-tem for \$500,000 cash. He also bought the wharves and docks at St. Johns, and agreed to build eight steamships for the coastwise traffic. He was to receive a cash subsidy of \$100,000 a year for 30 years for operating these

steamers. The land acquired by Reid under the contract included large coal fields, which he bound himself to work, producing not less than 50,000 tons a year, and paying the government a royalty of 10 cents a ton. The contract also gave Reid control of the copper and other mines, the lumber interests and the pulp mills. The contract was approved by the Newfoundland Legislature on March 11, 1898, and on the whole its workings have apparently been beneficial. Large public works have been carried on on a large scale, and Mr. Reid has entered into the fulfillment of his part of the agreement with his usual energy. Newfoundland, eliminating the lakes, rivers and barren sections, has about 28,000 square miles of arable, mineral and timber lands. Of these Reid owns personally 7,000 square miles-one-


CAUGHT IN CHURCH Stealing Pocketbooks of Women Who Are
