BOXERS DEFEAT CHINESE TROOPS

Missionaries Must Withdraw to the Interior. Hon. Herbert Asquith on Safeguards of Permanent Peace—Mrs. Gladstone's Condition Very Serious—Ashaanti Trouble Spreading.

Peking, May 28.—The diplomatic corps have decided to ask the Chinese foreign office to define explicitly the measures which the government intends to take in dealing with "Boxers."

Shanghai, May 28.—Reports received here indicate that affairs around Peking are extremely critical owing to the defeat of the government troops by the "Boxers."

Tien Tsin, May 28.—The "Boxers" burned the Lulin station in the Luthan Railway, 29 miles from Peking last night. They also wrecked the track, destroyed a number of cars and murdered several Chinese employees.

London, May 28.—The illness of Mrs. Gladstone is now reported to be more serious. Her strength is gradually falling, and the members of the cabinet have been summoned to Hawarden.

London, May 28.—It is reported that three European officers were killed and Capt. Ahlin and 100 Haussas were wounded in a recent effort by the Lagos Haussas to break the investiture of the tribesmen at Kumsissie.

London, May 28.—In a speech at the City Liberal Club the Right Hon. Herbert Asquith, formerly home secretary, after paying tribute to British and Boer valor, referred to the settlement of the character and extent of the dangerous territory which would be opened by which possessions in South Africa are encircled, that we would be blind indeed if we did not provide in the future adequate safeguards for permanent peace.
