—Mrs. Thos. Aiken, city, has returned

street, city.
—Mr. Dunn, of Moody's Institute, Chi-
cago, is the guest of Mr. and Mrs. (Rev.)
M. P. Talling.

—W. T. Evans, well known in London,
is the new president of the Hamilton
Young Liberal Club.

—Ald. Robt. Carrothers has applied for
a license for the hotel formerly occupied by
him on Horton street.

—John Leatham has been bound over to
keep the peace with his wife Elizabeth,
before Squire Jarvis.

—Mrs. R. S. Bodman, accompanied by
her son are visiting Mrs. Bodman's sister,
Mrs. McBrayne, Queen's avenue.

—Dr. Jas. Hanson, of New York, formerly
of this city, is here in the interests of
the Equitable Life Insurance Company of
New York.

—The cause of R. S. Murray & Co.'s
going out of business is the ill-health of the
senior proprietor, who has been a merchant
in London for many years.

—Local machinists propose to organize a
branch of the International Association of
their craft, and will meet in the K. of P.
Hall to-morrow evening for that purpose.

—The stock of James Porteous, Galt,
valued at \$8,644, was disposed of by
Auctioneer J. W. Jones yesterday, to J.
J. Howden, Galt, at 62½ cents on the
dollar.

—Mr. Walter Trick has returned to the
city after a three months' visit in Devon-
shire, England. While absent Mr. Trick
took with him a wife, who accompanied
him to his Canadian home.

—The body of the late Mrs. (Hon.)
Alexander Mackenzie passed through this
city on the G. T. R. last evening to Sarnia,
where it was interred this afternoon. The
funeral was very largely attended.

—John McEwen, butcher, brought suit at
the Division Court yesterday against J.
S. Farquhar for \$22 worth of meat supplied
to the Hub Restaurant when Mr. Greer was
in charge. Judge Davis reserved decision.

—The City Engineer has written John
Elliot, of St. Marys, informing him of the
dangerous condition of the approaches to
the bridge on the Wharfedale road, and
also that he would be held responsible in
case of accident.

—High Constable Schram has received
word from the Minister of Justice stating
that the complaint forwarded by him had
been received too late for action on it this
session, but that it would receive full con-
sideration during recess.

—A Kingston dispatch says: "Divisional
Officer Boulton and wife, of the Salvation
Army, are going to London to manage the
western division. He is succeeded by
Major Scott, of Toronto. Capt. Combs,
the local officer, will also leave."

—Mrs. Blalcher, wife of Mayor Blalcher,
of Hamilton, and mother of Mrs. S. Ster-
ling, of this city, fell on the street here
yesterday night and broke her right leg.
Mrs. Blalcher suffered considerable pain,
but the fracture was successfully set and
the sufferer is resting easily.

—The firemen had three runs yesterday.
The first blaze did \$50 damage to a barn
owned by Mr. Howie, Queen's avenue.
The second damaged to the extent of \$25
bedroom at the residence of John Murray,
grocer, 188 Hamilton road. The third run
was the result of a false alarm from box 31.

—A. S. Wigmore, formerly of this city,
and others served an injunction on the
Church of the Messiah vestry, Toronto, last
night, on the ground that their names had
been removed from the voters' book by the
parish tribunal. The vestry meeting was
not held and a judge will decide the right
of the action complained against.

—The merchant tailors of the city to the
number of fifteen met last night in the
establishment of Burns, on the street here,
to consider the situation. It was decided to
make an offer to the men to-day, which
they hope will be accepted, as it means
more money for them. "Business will not
allow us to pay high prices," said one of
the bosses, "and we are willing to do what
is fair. We think everything will be
adjusted satisfactorily and that the men
will return to work at once."

—Two members of the Military School
who got a rig from a livery stable near the
Grand Trunk station yesterday, besides
taking a ride also took numerous drinks in
the course of their trip. As a result they
soon became unfit to guide the horse, and
were upset near the Grigg House. The
men sustained no serious damage, but the
rig did not escape so well. However, they
settled matters with the stable-keeper and
managed to avoid police interruption.

—James O'Neill will appear at the

Chancery Court.
Bovman vs. Hargreaves is an action to
recover \$300 and interest that the plaintiff
alleges to have been overcharged on a land
deal. Last summer Mr. Bovman engaged
Mr. Hargreaves to buy some land for
him agreeing to allow him 2 per cent. com-
mission. The property in question was ac-
quired as a woodyard, and on it was Mr.
Hargreaves' real estate office. The land
was owned by a Toronto man, and a Mr.
D. H. Williams had the lease on it. Mr.
Hargreaves communicated with the owner
in Toronto, and he says the latter asked
\$2,000 for the property. Mr. Bovman
considered this too high and then Mr.
Hargreaves advised him to offer \$1,800.
This was accepted on account of the lease
on the property. Mr. Bovman paid the
\$1,800 in cash, together with the \$36 com-
mission. The plaintiff alleges that he has
since found out that all that was paid for
the land was \$1,500, and that the other
\$300 was obtained from him fraudulently.
The defense was a denial of agency, and it
was claimed that the transaction was
simply a purchase and sale of real estate.
Judgment was given for the full amount
of \$300 with interest. Costs to be paid by
the defendant. Pardon for plaintiff,
Magee & McKillop for defendant.

Before the Police Magistrate.
James Murphy and his wife Mary were
at the Police Court this morning, the
former charging the latter with drunken-
ness and vagrancy. For three or four
years, he said, he had been trying to get
her to reform, but had failed every time.
He was willing to give her another trial.
She pleaded for liberty and said she would
keep sober, but the magistrate found her
guilty and remanded her for a week for
sentence.

Ralph Leigh drives a horse which he is
apparently unable to manage, and on the
evening of Saturday, March 25, he nar-
rowly escaped running over some people
and colliding with a street car at the corner
of Richmond and Dundas streets. A fine
of \$2 or five days was imposed.

Thomas Cahill was bound over to keep

Thomas Alexander added another to his

the charge of vagrancy. He has been out
of jail only a short time and was remanded
for a month for sentence.

cupied part of the house. Loss, \$1,500; in-
surance, \$400.

Terrible Railroad Accident.
EDWARDSVILLE, Ill., April 3.—A terrible
railroad accident occurred a 6:15 o'clock
to-night on the Jacksonville Southern
Railroad, about three miles south of
Edwardsville, near Glen Vernon. Four
men were killed and a number of others
seriously injured.
