WAS A WHITECHAPEL WAIF.

For the first couple of years he worked industriously, and his employer was satisfied. It was discovered, however, that he was of a deceitful nature, and was subject to spells of moroseness. The family bore with him a long time, for they realized that it was not his own fault, but heredity and early environment, which were responsible for his nature. He had first seen the light of day in White-chapel slums in London. His mother was an habitual drunkard, while his father was an invalid. King had brothers and sisters with whom he corresponded after coming to Canada. WAS JEALOUS OF WILLIE.

The handle-bar et his wheel loosened as Jimmie Hunter, pacer for Monroe, was about to pass Leander and his pacemaker. Leand-er's wheel swerved, resulting in the smash-up of the wheels of Leander, Monroe and Hunter. Monroe was thrown into the grand stand and his skull was fractured, and he received other injuries. Hunter was injured about the head, face and legs. Mrs. Kirby, in the grand stand, received serious fracture of the head.

CAUSED BY A CHERRY PIT.
