As it was all crawled out of the ruins, scratched and badly frightened, but not seriously hurt.

Hodgins' barn was also wrecked, and the stables, in which were three horses, and the machine shed, were left intact. Thomas Abbott, of Cooper's Creek, and Chapel line, had a fine bank barn practically ruined, the building being blown down out of a chimney.

Several sheds on the farm of William Todhey were next blown down, and the house of Mr. J. B. Murray was struck and damaged, and Mr. George Brannan's house also suffered slightly.

The men showed great pluck and heroism, and the switchman, on going into the tunnel, climbed over the bodies of the driver and fireman into the cab of the engine and took the train out, picking up the stricken men as he went along. No one knew before that Blake would run an engine, as he had been employed as a switchman.
