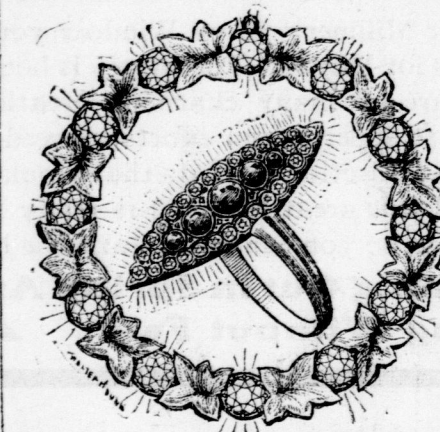

KNELL OF WAR
CORRESPONDENT

Bartlett Says the Good Old Days Have Gone, Thanks to the Censor.

Mr. Ellis Ashmead-Bartlett, the noted war correspondent for the London Times, who lectured in the Auditorium last evening, is a prepossessing young man of about 34 years of age. The impression had in some way become general in this city that he was the husband of the well-known Baroness Burdett-Coutts, but such is not the case. It is the war correspondent's uncle who wedded her. "Yes, I was through the Boer war, too," said Mr. Bartlett to the Advertiser last night, "and it seems now like a pea-shooting fair compared with the present war."

"You showed many pictures during your lecture which would not have been allowed to pass the press censor during the siege, did you not?" was the question.

"Yes, indeed," came the reply; "there is very little of what I have said or shown tonight that would have been allowed to pass by the censor. Descriptions of the size and positions of big guns, positions and arrangement of the various divisions of Nogi's army, pictures of the trenches, and so forth, would all have been forbidden, and rightly so."

"Is it true that the conditions prevailing in the Russo-Japanese war will, to a large extent do away with war correspondents?"

"Yes, the old days of war correspondents are gone," was the reply. "It is supremely essential to the success of an army that all that goes on should be kept secret. This comes hard on a few individuals," he added with a smile, "but the welfare of whole nations has to be the first consideration."

"But are there not quite a few things that go on at the front which, if reported by the correspondent, would do no harm?"

"Yes, but the commanding officer should take no risks. The good newspaperman always places the interests of his paper above everything, and besides, the war correspondent is not capable of judging what may or may not be injurious to the army's success. He is only thinking of what is news."

During the Turkish-Greek war, Mr. Bartlett was taken prisoner and kept for some time by the Greeks.

Speaking of his American tour, Mr. Bartlett said: "This Canada tour is a grand country. I am anxious to see the great west, of which I have heard so much. I am going to make a tour through the States, and then I hope to return to Canada to take in some of the sights."

Mr. Bartlett had a peculiar experience on his way from New York to Kingston, where he lectured lately. Not knowing the geography of Canada, he was ignorant of the fact that the River St. Lawrence lay between New York and Kingston. He therefore took the New York Central to its northern terminus, and then found he had to cross the river to get to Kingston. He chartered a special steamer and arrived at the lecture hall just at 8 o'clock.

LONDON BILL WAS
STRONGLY OPPOSED

The Clause Which Caused a Kick Was No. 13—Bill Laid Over.

City Solicitor Meredith, of London, in introducing to the private bills committee the city of London bill at Toronto yesterday morning, pointed out that one of the main clauses was for the ratification of a \$15,000 issue of debentures to build a breakwater to prevent floods in London West. The power of expropriation was also asked.

Clause 13 of the bill provided that the city should not be responsible for land damages caused by the building of the breakwater, and the chairman, as well as Mr. Harcourt, asked if this was reasonable.

Mr. Meredith believed so, but many of the members of the committee were scarcely satisfied, and particularly when Mr. I. P. Helmuth opposed the clause. Mr. Helmuth appeared on behalf of the Saunby Mill, and showed that if the water of the river were diverted by the breakwater so as to flow in the London West, but on the borders of the river to the north of that suburb, the owners would have absolutely no redress.

Hon. Adam Beck pointed out that the Saunby dam was one of the main causes of the spring freshets which endangered London West. He trusted the bill would go through, but in his speech he made no argument in favor of clause 13, a point commented upon by Mr. Joseph McDougall, of Ottawa.

FREIGHT RATES
HIT COAL DEALERS

Will Ask for Redress Against Alleged Abuses—Can't Fix Uniform Price.

The Association of Western Ontario Retail Coal Dealers closed their convention here last night, after discussing several important questions, behind closed doors. The following officers were elected for the year:

President—John C. Hay, Listowel (re-elected).
Vice-President—William Heaman, London (re-elected).

Secretary—Treasury—Deferred—Left in hands of executive committee.
Executive Board—F. Mann, Brantford; John Garroch, Sarnia; A. J. McIntosh, Woodstock; J. K. McLaughlin, Owen Sound; P. M. Griffin, St. Thomas.

As intimated before, resolutions will be presented both to the railway commission and the Ontario Legislature, asking for redress from certain alleged abuses which the coal dealers have been trying to have remedied for a long time. For one thing, the freight rate from Detroit to Listowel is 30 cents greater than that from the Bridge to Listowel.

"We do not understand why this should be," said one of the members of the association. "It practically shuts out coal coming from Detroit, and comes hard on the manufacturer."

One question that, as foretold, was backed for consideration at the convention, would have been of great interest to consumers, namely, the matter of retail price of coal west of London, Ontario. It was thought that the convention was going to fix upon a uniform price for coal, and whether

YOUNG MEN WANTED

Alberta Conference Needs Twenty-Five for Church Work.

Rev. James M. Harrison, of Medicine Hat, president of the Alberta Conference of the Methodist Church, is in the city, having come east with a commission to secure at least 25 active young men for church work in the west. The Alberta Conference was established only a year ago, but its

field has widened rapidly, and it must have more workers at once. Mr. Harrison gave a very interesting address in Wesley Hall last night, speaking on the subject of the west, and he referred in glowing terms to the prospects for that part of Canada. The land through which the Grand Trunk Pacific is to run, is, perhaps, the richest agricultural land in the world—a land capable of producing in some instances 50 bushels of oats to the acre, and 40 bushels of wheat. The land recently opened up by the Canadian Northern he described as equally as rich.
