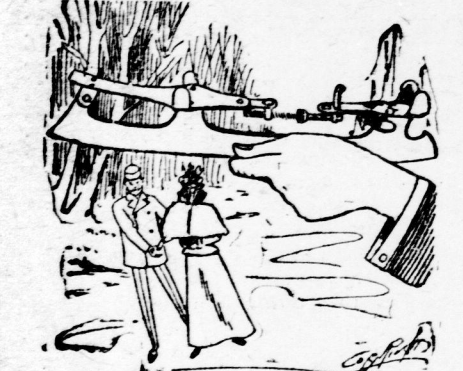

THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO TODAY

[From the London Advertiser of Jan. 16, 1871.]

The new council for 1871 met at noon and the city clerk having read the returns from the returning officers, the election of mayor was taken up.

All the members were present.

Ald. Fysh nominated Ald. J. M. Cousins, and urged his election to the civic chair as a mechanic, merchant and professional man, having enjoyed a monopoly of that distinction for the past few years.

Ald. F. E. Cornish also nominated a mechanic, Ald. James Egan.

Ald. Peel seconded the nomination of Ald. Egan.

Ald. Graydon seconded the nomination of Ald. James M. Cousins.

On the first vote, Ald. Cousins was elected by a vote of 12, 11 constituting a majority of the board.

Ex-Mayor Graydon conducted the new mayor to the chair and congratulated him on his election.

His words of congratulatory returned thanks, and stated that in assuming the chair for the year he would do everything in his power to make London a happy and prosperous city.

Messrs. A. G. Smyth and Alex. Gunn made application for appointment as auditor.

His worship appointed Mr. T. Westcott auditor.

Ald. Campbell moved, seconded by Ald. Fysh, that Mr. A. G. Smyth be auditor.

Ald. Peel moved, seconded by Ald. Cornish, that Mr. Alex. Gunn be auditor.

A vote being taken, Mr. A. G. Smyth was chosen auditor.

Ald. Fysh moved, seconded by Ald. Campbell, that the following members of the board be a select committee to strike standing committees for the year.

Ald. McCormick, Campbell, Cornish, Fysh, Graydon, Christie and Egan. Carried. The council then rose with the understanding that business be resumed at 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Oronhyatekha has been presented with a splendid gold watch by his friends on the Indian reserve near Belleville on the occasion of his removal to Stratford.

Harvey Washington Babcock, the indefatigable detective, is said to be at present confined to his bed from the effects of a wound inflicted with a knife by a prisoner he was taking to the county jail.

The first sod on the Brantford and Harrisburg Railway was turned this afternoon at 2 o'clock on the farm of Mr. Champ, adjoining the town. The mayor, William Mathews, Esq., performed the ceremony. About 300 persons were present, including the members of the council. The railway will be completed by Sept. 1.

The Manitobans have now to elect representatives to the House of Commons.

—Invitations are out for the Cortese Orchestra dance, to be held in the city hall, Jan. 19.

—Maro, the magician, will be the attraction at the Auditorium on Thursday evening. It is the opening number of the second half of the Y. M. C. A. course. The press is loud in its praise of Maro's work, not only as a magician, but the saxophone quartet which accompanies him is especially good.

—Mr. J. F. Holden (brother of Mr. M. E. Holden, manager of the Dominion Bank, of this city), who has been traffic manager of the Rock Island Railway, has been made vice-president of the Midland Valley Railway, which runs from Hore, Ark., to Pawhukie, I. T. Mr. Holden is a native of Whitby, and began his career on the Port Perry-Midland division of the Grand Trunk.

The manufacturers' committee of the city council met last night, and elected Ald. Wyatt chairman.

ALL RECOVERING.

Miss Alice Manson, who fell down a flight of stairs on Saturday, has been found by the Victoria Hospital physicians to have sustained no very serious injuries, and her recovery is now assured. Wm. Earl, who fell out of a hotel window some time ago, is also getting along nicely, while the traveler named Connel, who fell while alighting from a Grand Trunk train a week ago, has recovered and has left for his home in Toronto.

NEW RAILWAY CHARTER.

At the next session of the Dominion Parliament a company called the West Ontario Pacific Railway Company will apply for a charter to build a steam road from a point at or near London to run in a northerly direction through the counties of Middlesex, Oxford, Perth, Huron and Bruce to a point on Lake Huron in either one of the last two named counties. Mr. Andrew T. Thompson, of Ottawa, is acting as solicitor for the new company, which is to form a part of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

License Reduction Goes Through Council 6 to 3

Meeting Opened Early and Trio of Aldermen Were Absent—Business Rushed.

The city council, by a vote of six to three, last night decided to have the city solicitor prepare a bylaw to reduce the number of liquor licenses in London to 26.

Mayor Judd, having taken advantage of the rule which says that the council must meet at 7:30, there were only nine aldermen in the chamber when the vote was taken. Alds. Greenlee, Gillean and Matthews being absent, though they were all in their chairs by 8 o'clock. The vote was taken at ten minutes of eight. It was as follows:

Yeas—Alds. Gerry, Wyatt, Armstrong, Stevenson, Booth and Cooper.

Nays—Alds. Garratt, Saunders and Forriest.

The meeting was a record-breaker, in that it lasted but 40 minutes.

The council, by a vote of 11 to 1, Ald. Cooper alone voting nay, decided to memorialize the Ontario Government, to so amend the municipal act as to allow municipal councils by a two-thirds vote of all the members, to lay permanent pavements on streets where the people cannot agree as to the class of roadway desired.

On motion of Ald. Garratt, the council decided to ask No. 1 committee to report as to the cost and advisability of revising the bylaws of the council.

A communication from City Engineer Graydon was read, recommending that the Ontario Legislature be asked to amend the local improvement act, so as to allow the city to pave lanes and alleys, the same as streets. It was referred to No. 2 committee.

Ald. Gillean gave notice of a motion re a bylaw to be passed, which will enable the tax collector to issue warrants for all amounts of income taxes amounting to or under \$5, which are not paid by the 15th of September each year.

The following petitions were received and referred to committees: For an electric light on the corner of Oxford and College streets; for an electric light on Lovett street, east of the intersection of Kitchener avenue; for the watering of College avenue, from Oxford to St. James.

Ald. Armstrong gave notice of motion re securing new furniture for the office of Police Magistrate Love.

The reports of the several committees passed.

The illness of Ald. Matthews figured in the council's proceedings for a while. Ald. Armstrong moved, seconded by Ald. Saunders, that in case Ald. Matthews is too ill to go to Toronto on the hygienic deputation, the council appoint Dr. W. J. Stevenson to take his place. The motion was defeated by a vote of 6 to 5. The matter was then left in the hands of the chairman of No. 1 committee.

A bylaw to rearrange the polling subdivisions was put through. It provides for a new subdivision in ward 1, one in ward 2, two in ward 3, and 2 in ward 4. This makes the total number of subdivisions in the city 49.

DARCH RE-ELECTED CHAIRMAN OF THE WATERWORKS BOARD

Inaugural Meeting for the Year—Suggestions for Commissioners to Consider.

The board of water commissioners for 1906 held its inaugural meeting yesterday afternoon in the city hall.

The two new members, Mayor Judd and Commissioner Saunders, were present, together with Commissioner Darch, who served last year. Mr. Darch, on motion of Commissioner Saunders, seconded by the mayor, was re-elected chairman of the board. He briefly thanked the board and assured them that he highly appreciated the honor. Several matters of vital importance to the citizens would in the near future have to be dealt with, he said. While the new main had been turned down by the electorate, the fact remained that the board must secure sufficient fire fighting pressure, and since several statements had been made on the platform in the recent election, resting upon the supply, Mr. Darch thought it advisable to ask the engineer to make a full report upon it. Attention must at an early date be given to a readjustment of the water rates. It was desired that consumers be charged only cost or as near cost as possible for water.

Board ought to make an appropriation for meters, said the chairman. Many firms were getting a great supply of water at a very low rate and these should be made to pay by meter. The chairman also referred to electrolysis, and he hoped that amicable arrangements could be made with the street railway company regarding damage to water mains from that cause. The board was in duty bound to protect the city's interests in this matter. The board would also have to deal with the street railway company's contract for the Springbank auditorium, as the present agreement ran out on May 1, and then the auditorium would belong entirely to the city.

Messrs. George F. Jewell and B. Blandford were reappointed auditors for 1906.

The petition of the Cold Storage Company for a remission of \$124.54 in water rates was granted, the amount being charged up to the city.

Commissioner Saunders thought that account should be kept of all such items and exemptions.

Chairman Darch said that last year not more than \$10 was remitted in this manner.

Engineer Moore pointed out that there were no exemptions now.

A communication from A. J. Roberts, secretary of an insurance company, was read.

Maurice Baldwin, of Bathurst street, was granted a small reduction in his water rates. "I have four horses and two cows," said Baldwin, "but the horses are away all summer, and the cows are away most of the time. If I have to pay this I'll have a well or have a meter installed."

One of the board suggested that

Baldwin should get the animals to drink only half as much.

Baldwin will be assessed for four horses and one cow.

Mr. C. B. King, of the street railway company, wrote the board asking that the auditorium at Springbank be leased to the company, and that it be covered. The sides could be left open so that those spectators on the hillside could view the stage.

Chairman Darch explained that the auditorium belonged to the company until May 1. Then it became the property of the commission. Others were after the theater, but it would be wise for anyone leasing it to co-operate with the street railway company. The Stoddart Company would pay \$500 a year if a roof were put on the theater.

The chairman suggested that the street railway company build the roof and rent the theater for a number of years.

There is a possibility of the company raising their fares from 10 to 15 cents should they not get the theater, but this would likely be a most unwise move, financially. The matter was laid over.

There were 3,435,000 gallons of water pumped daily during the last two weeks in December, and 3,370,000 gallons since Jan. 1. These figures are about the same as last year's.
