On Dec. 29, 1904, appeared an allowance of \$33 66, marked as special account credited as cash. It was a friendly gift made about Christmas time. It was purely a gift.

Was Asked to Exchange.

Mr. Harding had come to witness and had asked him to exchange checks. It had been done. The first instance had been in 1905 for an amount of about \$375. This check business was not recorded in the books. It had been simi-

Witness said this was one given in exchange for Harding's. He knew it was Mr. Harding's because they were at that time exchanging checks with no record.

Of further checks for \$375 and \$325 witness gave same answers.

During this period witness' firm had been receiving and filling orders through Mr. Harding from the department.

The inquiry then adjourned.
