Ten Millions Will Be Insured
Before Week End—Doctors
Still in Revolt.

London, July 17.—So far as can be judged during the three days the new national insurance act, compelling working people to insure against sickness and disablement, has been in force, and before any payment except in the case of casual laborers

The doctors, as represented by the British Medical Association, are still in revolt against the act, and announce their intention of refusing to attend patients under its provisions.

An organization, including a number of society people, has also been formed with the object of resisting the payments for domestic servants. This, however, is the only real opposition so that there has to face is that of the doctors. The Government has offered the doctors the sum of four shillings and six pence (approximately \$1.00) annually for each person insured, but the doctors demand eight shillings a piece.

The workmen and workwomen have taken up the great reform of salariness, and the Government estimates that of the 13,000,000 persons subsisting before the act came into force upwards of 10,000,000 have readily registered with approved societies, which have undertaken to administer the act, and another 500,000 have taken out cards at the reform offices.
