

NOTED ANGLICAN CHURCHMAN SPEAKS HERE SUNDAY

DEAN ROGERS WILL ATTEND CRONYN MEMORIAL JUBILEE

Several Out-of-Town Speakers to Address City Congregations Tomorrow.

"WHITE" GIFT SERVICE

Church services in the city tomorrow will be marked by the presence of several out-of-town speakers, and by special celebrations. Chief among these will be the jubilee celebration at Cronyn Memorial Church, at which the speakers will be Very Rev. Dean Rogers, of St. Paul's Cathedral, Detroit. Dean Rogers is not a stranger in this city. Known internationally as a speaker, he has been heard in London a great many times by radio fans, who may listen weekly to his sermon broadcasted from St. Paul's Cathedral. Of the Church of England, on this side of the Atlantic, Dean Rogers is an outstanding figure. He will preach at the evening service, and will be a guest also at the congregation jubilee supper, which is being held in the parish hall on Monday evening. In the morning, the rector, Rev. G. C. Warner, will preach.

Proceeding the evening service there will be a brief trio recital, commencing at 6:30, in which Mr. Warner, cellist; Douglas Fetherston, violinist; and Florence Gilmore, at the organ, will take part.

At St. James' Church, South London, the approach of Christmas will be emphasized by the "White Gift Service" in the afternoon. Nearly throughout the city these services are a means of spreading cheer and goodwill among the less fortunate families. Each service of the Sunday school brings his contribution, and in their white wrappings the pile of gifts are dedicated to Christmas service.

Christmas Shopping.

In his weekly sermonette, Dr. Beattie, of the First Presbyterian Church, will deal with Christmas shopping, giving a concise three-minute talk on this now highly important institution.

Rev. James McKay, of New St. James' Church, North London, will be absent from his pulpit tomorrow, having been invited to the Presbyterian Church at Tavistock to conduct anniversary services there. Rev. H. H. Turner, B.A., D.D., of Tavistock, will conduct the services at St. James' Church.

FEDERALS IN MEXICO ROUT INSURGENT TROOPS

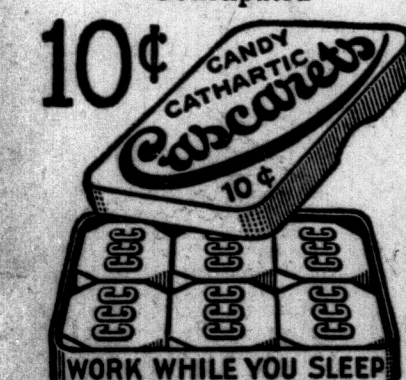

PREMIER PRAISES WORK OF GRAHAM

Sends Letter of Appreciation of Hon. George P. Graham to Banquet Chairman.

An appreciation by the premier of the service of Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways and canals, is contained in the following letter received by Sir John Gibson, chairman of the Graham banquet held in Toronto on Dec. 12. The premier expressed his regret at not being present.

"My dear Sir John: I wish you would express to our Liberal friends present at the banquet in honor of my friend and colleague, Mr. Graham, my great regret at finding it impossible to join with them in this expression of the appreciation felt by the Liberals of our province of Mr. Graham's services to our country, both at home and abroad."

But for this circumstance I would have accompanied Mr. Graham to Toronto tonight or have gone up by day train tomorrow to be present at the banquet with yourself and other friends in doing honor to Mr. Graham tomorrow night."

"It was with the greatest pleasure that I learned of the banquet being tendered Mr. Graham by our friends. His representation of Canada at the League of Nations and the Imperial Conference in London, was such as to reflect great honor upon the Dominion and our province of Ontario in particular. I cannot speak too cordially of the invaluable assistance given me by both Sir Lomer Gouin and Mr. Graham in the conduct of the Imperial Conference. Their counsel and co-operation were ever helpful and never failing."

"I cannot too sincerely express the hope that in all particulars the banquet tomorrow night will be worthy of our friend whom it is intended to honor. I would like to see him long and useful public service to our country, and worthy the place which he holds in the present administration of the country's affairs and in the hearts of his fellow countrymen."

Associated Press Despatch. London, Dec. 14.—Enormous numbers of visitors from the provinces are coming in to do their Christmas shopping in London. Some idea of their numbers can be formed when it is stated that cheap fares are now in operation on an average of over a train a day from all parts of England and Wales.

In almost every big shop the toy department runs a special show for the children. A few years ago it was thought enterprising if a Santa Claus in white beard, fur-trimmed scarlet robe and grease-paint, were engaged to hand out toys. Now have, for instance, a toboggan trip to the Caves of a Thousand Wonders, an expedition to the North Pole, complete with seals and penguins by miniature railway; Dickens' "Old Curiosity Shop," with attendants in the costume of the period; or a children's motor show, with models, complete to the smallest detail, of all the famous makes. One of the most ingenious and popular of these attractions is the trip from Dover to Calais by Channel Tunnel. The traveler enters a railway carriage and makes his "crossing" with fish swimming most realistically outside the windows; at "Calais," where the station is cut in a cliff, he steps from the train on to real sand, with a view of waves and channel steamboats, and receives a "press from France" from the hands of charming French peasant girls.

The Queen began her Christmas shopping some time ago with a three hours' visit to one of the great London shops, buying, among other things, glass ware and clocks. A few years ago the shopping of a royal personage was surrounded by almost as much ceremony as a state procession. Equerries appeared at the favored shop, red carpets were hurried out, a way was cleared and decorated, and any vehicles in the street were moved away. Today, all that happens is that, with a few minutes of the royal customer's arrival the managing director of the establishment receives a telephone message, and he is in attendance during the visit. Otherwise, everybody carries on as usual; the assistants from whom purchasers are made may not even recognize their customer, no fuss, no ceremony, no formality at all, and royalties go shopping as members of the ordinary public.

NEW ASSOCIATION OF ALL HOSPITALS FOR MORE UNITY

Col. W. M. Gartshore, the New President, Explains Functions of Organization.

VARIOUS COMMITTEES

Special Work Will Be Looked Into Matter of Smaller Hospitals.

In explaining the function of the newly created Ontario Hospitals' Association, Colonel W. M. Gartshore, who is the first president of the association, said this morning:

"The association, which was conceived by men in the province interested in the work of our hospitals, places us on a level in this way with the other provinces. The association will be divided into various committees, which will be devoted to such sides of hospital work as hospitals for the insane, tubercular hospitals, children's hospitals, all soldier institutions, and the nursing side of hospital work."

"All these committees will report regularly to the central committee and such recommendations as are thought advisable will be made from time to time to the provincial government, as to improving conditions in all kinds of hospitals. A special activity of the association will be to look into the matter of the smaller country hospitals. It is felt that here there is perhaps a great deal of useful advisory work that can be done in this way."

Colonel Gartshore stated that the annual classification of hospitals by the American College of Surgeons will be continued as before, and that the association is not concerned in this method of examinations. "This classification," he said, "is a voluntary thing on its part, and we don't have to follow any of their suggestions unless we agree with their findings. For this reason, they conduct the same classification of all the South American, as well as the American, hospitals, and by their findings, at least a fairly accurate criticism of our own institutions."

RECOUNT LIKELY FOR WEDNESDAY

City Clerk Baker Explains Procedure in Ward Three Case.

The recount in the votes cast at the last election in ward three for Alderman Gordon Drake and John Ashton will probably take place on Wednesday of next week, according to the city clerk.

"The procedure in a recount is exactly the same as the usual proceedings in counting votes," Mr. Baker said today. "In the event of a tie the casting vote, unfortunately, belongs to me."

He explained that in reality, it was not so hard on him because halfways made it a practice in the event of a tie to cast his deciding vote for the man he was voting against, thus he rather gets rid of any bias or suggestion of favoring any particular candidate.

John Ashton, in whose behalf the recount is to be made, was never anxious for this procedure and it was the Labor party who paid the necessary fee of \$25.

Mr. Ashton in a spirit of good sportsmanship was quite willing to take his one vote defeat and recognize Gordon Drake as the elected representative for ward three.
