BLUSTERY

The weather has been cold and blustery for the past week. Monday afternoon and evening were exceedingly blustery.

LOST VALUABLE HORSE

The Shives Lumber Co. lost a valuable horse on the way up to their lumber last week from distemper. This was one of a recent importation.

HAVE NETS OUT

The cold weather of the past week has closed the river down to the bay and the fishermen have their nets down in readiness for the next spring tides, when it is hoped good catches of smelt will be taken.

SOME COLD

Thermometer hovering around 20 degrees below zero, and the wind blowing a gale, made Tuesday morning a very cold one. The Ocean Limited was three hours late on account of heavy rail and cold.

BREAK IN WATER MAIN

A bad break in the water main was in evidence Wednesday morning in front of the Graphic office. The water found its way into the furnace and pressroom of the Graphic, causing considerable inconvenience but little damage. Men are now repairing the leak. For a time there was no water on the high levels.

MANY

Since the taking over of the Canada Eastern and the International railways it has been found necessary to rearrange the officials formerly housed at Moncton. With this in view the new depot here was built with spacious offices on the second floor. Now after five years these have proved entirely inadequate and new offices have had to be provided for some departments. With this in view the former residence of the late Supt. E. Price is being overhauled and will be made to house several departments among these being the Trackmasters and Mr. Savages.

This change will relieve the congestion to some extent.

HORSE DROWNED

Mr. Dugald A. Myles, of Brandy Brook, had the misfortune to lose a valuable mare, in the ice, last week. The ice had been made for several days, and teams had crossed in this place three days previous to the accident. Mr. Myles, who is very careful on the ice, was attempting to cross in order to haul wood for the buildings on the opposite side of the river, and following the track, already made drove out on the ice. It gave way at once in a great camel, and horse and sled immediately disappeared. This ice, instead of strengthening during the three night severe frost, following the first crossing had apparently weakened and worn away. This horse was heavier than those that had crossed in safety before this.

AS OF OLD

The train service west of Campbellton has gone back to the old time, that is the West Local leaves here 8 o'clock. The suburban at 9.15 has been taken off. So that now it is impossible for people to come to Campbellton and get home the same day, except from Matapedia, when the Limited stops, no doubt this arrangement will last only during the winter.

STOLE BOOZE

Some time ago the I. C. R. freight shed at Anderson was entered and a barrel containing whiskey was stolen. I. C. R. detective Harry Oulligan was informed and arrested four men who admitted their guilt before Judge Mathison and on account of their former standing in the community and their promise of future good behavior and paying all costs, they were allowed to go on suspended sentence.

A GOOD SERVICE

The new suburban train No. 229 between Newcastle and Campbellton made its first trip Monday arriving here with a large number of passengers about 10 minutes late. The new train consists of two passenger coaches and four box cars. This train No. 230 leaves here at 6 o'clock, crossing the local at Dalhousie Junction, and a change of 20 minutes is necessary in the latter's arrival here, or 6.50 instead of 6.30.

HAND GRIP WANTED

During a trip of a special passenger train from St. Leonards to Campbellton in December some person evidently made a mistake and took a small hand grip belonging to Mr. P. J. Veniot from the car. This grip contained very little of value to any one but Mr. Veniot as it contained valuable personal insurance and other papers which cannot be replaced. If the party who took it return it to any station or give it to any employer of the I. C. R. no questions will be asked. As it is of no value to anyone outside Mr. Veniot we hope an effort will be made to return it to him.

DEAD IN EAST BOSTON

William M. Dooley, at one time editor of the Curling Western Star, and more recently of the Bell Island Miner, died at East Boston on November 29. Dooley, who was born at battle Harbor, Labrador, forty years ago, was at one time on the editorial staff of The Campbellton Graphic. N. B. he also served as reporter on the St. John, N. B. Globe for a time, and at different times he served as reporter on the Boston Post and other United States papers.

About six years ago Dooley married Miss Maud Irvine, daughter of Capt. S. A. Irvine, of Bermuda, B. W. I.

NEW AUTOMOBILE

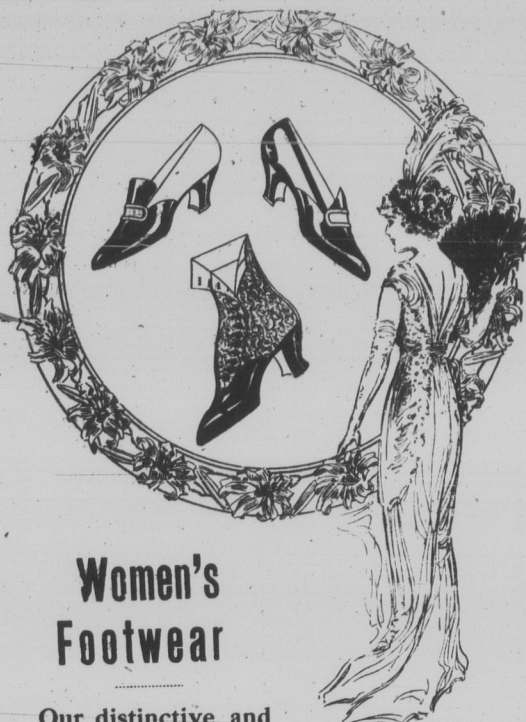
