GROUPS LICENSES.
The Temperance Alliance and the Aldermanic Candidates—Questions and Answers—What the Candidates Promise—Mr. Wm Munna, secretary of the Toronto branch of the Temperance Alliance, recently sent circulars to all the candidates for aldermanic honours in Toronto, asking them whether, if elected, they would be willing to vote for a by-law doing away with the selling of liquor for sale in grocery stores, and requiring the shopkeeper to confine the business of his shop solely and exclusively to the keeping and selling of liquor. Up to last night a number of replies had been received, of which the following is the essential purport—

Ald H. E. Clark replies:—While I am in favor of lessening the traffic in spirituous liquor—my whole mind and conduct prove that I am not ready to pledge myself beforehand to vote for any by-law or motion until it comes fairly before the council. Then, as I never strike a vote, I may be judged to vote for or against as I see fit.

Mr. Robert J. Fleming replies:—The committee have forestalled me a little in placing before the grocers' license question as it has been a prominent plank in my platform. Should I be elected I will do all I can to wipe out the iniquitous privilege of selling liquor in grocery stores.
