Spring wheat may be set down as a general failure, for while a few good fields are reported, the common result is a small yield of inferior quality. The estimated yield is 5,633,117 bush, against 9,518,553 last year and 9,713,579 for the average of six years.

The barley crop was awad with smarcely any fairly from discoloration, but while the grain is bright it is light in weight and the yield per acre is less than for any harvest of the last six years. The total product is 17,134,830 bush, which is 2,377,448 less than last year and 2,431,553 less than the average of six years.

Owing to the hot, dry summer the cals crop is below the average in yield, and it is also light in the measure. For a few localities, where the land was low and new or where local showers presuled, better accounts are given. The estimated product is 49,345,101 bush from 1,682,463 acres, against 68,665,608 from 1,521,901 acres last year.

The accounts of peas are more varied than those of any other crop. Where sown early and favored by local showers a fair yield is reported, but under other conditions the pods filled imperfectly, and in some localities the grop was nearly a total failure. The estimated visid is 12,178,332 bush, from 726,756 acres.




