Any interest from investments mortgages, bonds, Victory and War Loan, etc., exceeding \$800.

2. Personal earnings (which includes), wages, fees, commissions, bonuses, gratuities, profits, etc., exceeding \$1,000, with any other earning (including rent derived from real estate within Ontario). Householders (married men under 60 years) who were in receipt of income in the year 1922 of:

1. Personal earnings in excess of 2. Any interest from any investment when the total income exceeds \$1,500 (total income includes rents or any other income whatsoever).

Widows or persons who were over 60 years on or prior to 31st of December, 1. Income exceeding \$2,000 from any source. Persons are not required to file re-

turn under By-law No. 6935 who have filed return of income upon request of Assessment Commissioner. Every unmarried person claiming to
