SAUCES OF VARIOUS KINDS.

Tartar, tomato, drawn butter, egg, sauces are all served with iish. Drawn butter sauce is made like the regulation "white" sauce, except that water is employed for drawn butter in place of milk or cream. For either use one tablespoonful of butter and boiled a flavoring of lemon juice, finely chopped parsiey and grated onion. Hard boiled eggs cut fine are also usually employed. Egg sauce is the drawn butter with chopped hard boiled egg added just before sending to table. Sauce piquante is made by adding to drawn butter sauce chopped pickle and capers, lemon juice, chopped parsiey and a dash of uaprika or cayenne.

To make oyster sauce, let a pint of oysters cook in their own liquor until the gills begin to ruffle. Then remove the oysters, and add the liquor to one cupful of milk or cream, and let the mixture come to a boil. Stir into it three tablespoonfuls of butter that have been creamed together, and when they are scalded through, serve.
