B. 70, Elysium 77, Bethlehem 89, Britannia, 91, Nelson 95, North 99.

It is much to be regretted that subordinate Divisions do not attend more strictly to their duty in forwarding the quarterly Returns; but whether the fault lays with them or the Deputies, is beyond my power to state, although from what experience I have had since assuming this office, it is apparent that much apathy exists on both sides, and it appears inexplicable that no returns have been received from Windsor, where several Divisions are located, and which has a daily mail to the city.

The following Divisions are not working:—Prince William 29, Albion 33, Minas 42, Smitten Rock 53, Rock 63, Pioneer 64, Columbia 73, Greenwood 78, Father Matthew 85, Rising Star 94. The latter Division has intimated its intention of surrendering.

Since the Annual Session the following Divisions have surrendered:—Douglasville 48, Mahone Bay 66, Mariner's 69. There are several charters belonging to Divisions which have surrendered previously, and not handed into this office, but which should have been—and parties having them in possession, are requested to do so. The above Divisions had presented a sickly appearance for some time, and a surrender of their charters was to be expected, not having sufficient members to work them. But to contra this there are two petitions handed in for new Charters, respectably signed, and with every appearance of becoming bright stars in the Order.

Although the Order has not progressed so much as its ardent friends could wish, yet it has taken a hold upon the minds of the people, that will not be easily shaken, and its future march must be upward and onward until the star of Temperance shines brightly in
