

## CANADIAN UNIVERSITY IN FRANCE (continued)

### Location

The Université canadienne en France programme is located on the magnificent 42 acre Mont Leuze estate in Villefranche-sur-mer. Academic activities take place in an imposing group of buildings on a campus overlooking the Mediterranean. Student residences are located on the campus.

Villefranche is only 6 kilometres from Nice, where students can take advantage of the cultural attractions of one of the most interesting cities in France. Also within easy reach of Villefranche are numerous places of historical and artistic attraction.

The Villefranche location is also ideal for students who wish to range further afield in Europe during the breaks in the academic year. Nice enjoys an excellent train service and most of Europe can be reached by rail in less than 24 hours.

### Main Programme

The central activity of the Université canadienne en France is a one-year programme consisting primarily of courses in language, literature, humanities and social sciences specially selected from the first three years of an Ontario university curriculum. The humanities component includes courses in classics, history, music, and philosophy. The social sciences contribute courses in economics and political science.

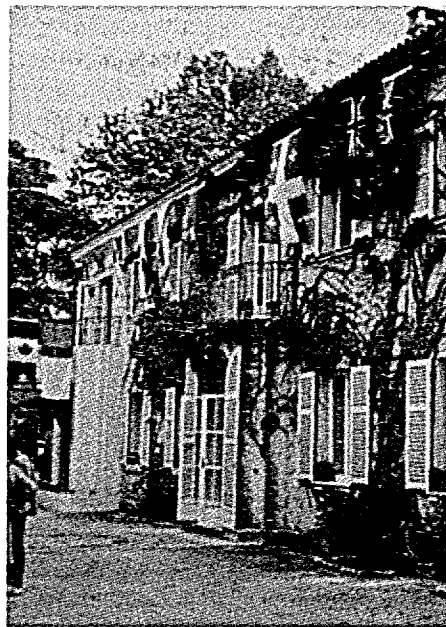
A fundamental aim of the programme is to provide students with the opportunity to improve their skills in both French and English. In addition to the language and literature courses offered in each language, the humanities and social sciences compo-

nent is made up of a set of courses offered in English and a different set offered in French. This means that students who take courses from both sets will have a wider choice. It is, however, possible to make up a full programme (10 three-credit courses) in which all the courses (except language courses) are given in either English or French. The University encourages students to take courses in both languages and, except in language courses, students may submit work and write examinations in either English or French.

Each year a particular theme is chosen to give focus to the programme. For 1988-89 many of the courses have been chosen to illustrate the theme 'The Renaissance'. In 1989-90 the theme will be 'The Mediterranean'.

### Admission Requirements

1. Students should have completed a minimum of one full year of studies at a Canadian university (equivalent to four full year courses or 24 credits); or DEC in Quebec; or International Baccalaureate.
2. Students must be in good academic standing at their home university.
3. Students must obtain a Letter of Permission from their home universities; this will ensure that credit courses in France are transferable to the students' programmes at their own universities.
4. Knowledge of and interest in a second language and culture will be considered in the evaluation of candidates □
