EXCHANGE AGREEMENTS—CHINESE DELEGATIONS

Question No. 2,152-Mr. Herbert:

1. Have any scientific, cultural or technical exchange agreements been signed with China in the past three years?

2. Did Chinese government delegations, during this period, visit Canada to discuss engineering, educational and medical subjects and, if so, does the government send representatives to such discussion sessions?

Hon. Mark MacGuigan (Secretary of State for External Affairs): 1. The Canadian government has signed no scientific, cultural or technical exchange agreements with the People's Republic of China during the past three years nor are there any at present under active consideration.

2. A number of official government delegations from the People's Republic of China have visited Canada during the past three years to discuss a broad variety of subjects in such areas as engineering, education and medicine. When Chinese delegations visit Canada at the invitation of Canadian government departments, representatives of the latter host the visitors throughout their stay and are usually the primary interlocutors. They also normally accompany the delegations on calls on private industry. On the other hand, when Chinese delegations are invited by private industry or other levels of government, the federal government ordinarily plays a facilitative role but only on occasion attends these meetings.
